#### Cost of Living Steadily Increases

Ottawa, Feb. 14-The Department of Labor's record for January shows the general price level the highest on record. Since the middle of June last a pronounced and continuous upward movement has been in progress, reaching its zenith in January. The department's index number which is based on the observation of fluctuations in 261 commodities selected for their representative character, rose to 131.0 in January; that is, general prices were 31 per cent higher in that month than was the average for the decade of 1890-1899, which is taken by the department as the standard of comparison in constructing its number. Compared with prices in 1897, the lowest year in indispensable booklet, "5000 Facts the past quarter century, prices are now at least 45 per cent higher.

There were nine trade disputes durng January, involving 1,130 employes and records show 86 fatal accidents.

#### NO STATE DINNER AT LEGISLATURE OPENING

Fredericton, Feb. 17-Official announcement is made to-day that there will not be a state dinner on the evening of the opening of the next session of the provincial legislature on Thursday, March 7th. The reason given is that it would be impossible for the new Lieutenant Governor to issue invitations for an official function before he has been sworn in. The state dinner, therefore, will be given on Thursday, March 14th., at the Barker House. It is understood that Hon. Mr. Wood will be sworn in as Lieutenant Governor at noon on Thursday, March 7th., and that the necessary oaths will be administered to the new members of the legislature about the same time. To-day the official military orders for the opening of the legislature were announced, and the arrangements will be the same as already stated in the Globe.

#### VALLEY RAILWAY LEASS DISCUSSED

Fredericton, Feb. 17-Hon. H. F. McLeod, Provincial Secretary, returned to-day from Ottawa, where, with Attorney General Grimmer, he held conferences with Hon. Frank Cochrane, Minister of Railways, during "The Cultivation of the Devotional which the provisions of the agreement for the lease of the St. John Valley Railway to the Dominion government were discussed. Substantial progress was made, and it is expected that within a short time the lease will be executed.

Early in the week representatives of the Dominion Alliance called on the leader of the Conservative government and the leader of the Liberal opposition in order to impress their views on these gentlemen and on the causes they represent. Abolition of the bar and of treating were the main features in their demand. If he does not declare for prohibition he is sure to have an advanced temperance programme.



#### New Steel Bridge To Be Constructed Edmundston

Announcement was made here today by Mr. Harry M. Blair, Secretary of the Provincial Board of works, of the calling of tenders for the building of seven new bridges in the province. Four of these are to be in Queens County, one in Kings County, one in Carleton County, and one in Madawsska County.

There is to be a new bridge at Hunters Ferry, Parish of Canning, Queens County. It is to consist of six wooden covered spans, 114 feet each in length, and is to have concrete piers, and pile foundation. A bridge is to be built at Burpee, Parish of Chipman, Queens County. It will be a single span, 164 feet in length and will have concrete piers. The Chase bridge, Chipman Parish, is to be rebuilt and will be a single span structure 104 feet in length. A new bridge is to be erected at

Cole's Island and is to consist of two wooden spans and to have concrete substructure. The tenders on all of the above bridges will close on Monday, March 4th.

A steel bridge of one span. 137 feet in length, is to be built of Becacguimac Mouth, in the Parish of Brighton, Carleton County. It will have concrete piers. At Edmundston a three steel truss span bridge is to be built. The spans are to be 104 feet in length each from centre to centre, and the piers will be of concrete. A two-span steel truss structure is to be constructed at Heine Bridge superstructure, in the parish of Studholm, Kings County, The piers are to be of concrete. The tenders on the last three bridges will close on April 1st.
