Neuralgia

Neuralgia will often yield to a good
dose of castor oil which thoroughly
cleanses the system, after local applica-
tions fail.

TO GET RID OF ANTS

Mix well two parts of granulated
sugar and one part of powdered borax,
and place where the ants are most
troublesome. Keep the mixture dry
and renew often, as it is ineffective if
moist.

Add a little water to the seeds scooped
out of a cucumber and wash the shelves
with the mixture.

Kerosene or boiling water poured
over an ant hill or a shelf infected with
ants will quickly remove them.

Sprinkle cayenne pepper into the
crevices of drawers, shelves, etc., to
keep ants away.

Tack sticky fly-paper, gummed side
downwards, on the surface of shelves
which ants infest.

A CONVENIENT SPOON

Often being annoyed by the spoon
slipping into the contents of a sauce-
pan, I hit upon the following device:
I selected a spoon that was somewhat
flexible, and with wire pincers bent over
the end of the handle to form a hook by
which the spoon could be hung on the
edge of the dish. It has since proved

have.

BEAN SOUP

One-half pint of beans, one table-
spoonful butter, two sliced onions, one-
half sliced turnip, one-half sliced potato,
one cupful of milk, one-quarter cupful
of rich cream. Wash the beans well
and soak them overnight in cold water.
Melt the butter in a saucepan; add the
beans and stir thoroughly. Add also
the two sliced onions, the turnip and the
potato, a teaspoonful of salt and a
quart of cold water. Let the soup come
to a boil, and allow it to simmer gently
for three hours. Then rub through a
sieve, and add the milk, a little pepper
and more salt if required. Return the
soup to the pan and stir over the fire
until it boils. Serve very hot with fried
croutons. A quarter cupful of good
cream, though not necessary, will
greatly improve the soup if added just
before serving.

Old Brooklyn Bridge Gets a Little Shaky

New York, May 16.—That some
fears are felt for the safety of the
old Brooklyn bridge, which still
carries a considerable share of traf-
fic between Manhattan and Brook-
lyn, is indicated by orders issued
by the City Bridge Department
prohibiting heavy teams from us-
ing the roadways and directing the
elevated railroads to curtail their
traffic during the rush hours. Ex-
tensive repairs are being made to
the structure.

A statement given out by the
secretary of the Public Service
Board says:

"The bridge is rather old, and
its construction is not the most
modern by any means, but with
the repairs that are continually be-
ing made, it is safe to believe that
it will be many years before it will
be necessary to condemn it. Pre-
ventive measures are always best.

"The strain on the bridge, when
heavily laden with cars, trains and
trucks is naturally very great, and
for this reason it has been deemed
wise to restrict traffic thereon."

Advent of 'Longshoremen From St. John Resented in Montreal

A Maritime despatch says:—

"A body of St. John, N. B.,
'longshoremen stirred up turmoil in
local labor ranks yesterday, and a
free fight nearly ensued on the
water front. The easterners had
come to Montreal to work. There is a
tax of \$7 or \$8 a head on Montreal
men going to St. John to work,
and thus there was some ill feeling
on the part of several of the Mont-
real 'longshoremen when they
found St. John men coming to
work here, unimpeded by any re-
striction.

"The difficulty was finally set-
tled however by the St. John men
leaving the gang with which they
had been working, and finding
employment with non-union work-
ers. This they had no difficulty
in doing, as there is a scarcity of
labor in the port at present."

Lloyd's reports for the three months
ending Dec. 1, last, the loss or condem-
nation of 235 ships of 100 tons or over.
Of these twenty-four were abandoned
at sea, seven burned, twenty-one were
lost by collision, thirty foundered and
123 wrecked.

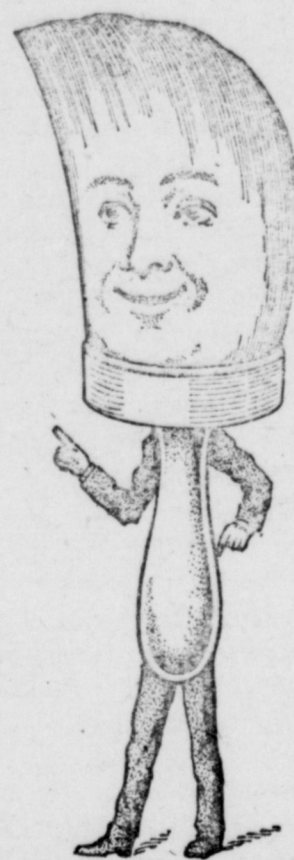

Are All Sardines

London, May, 12.—After a legal bat-
tle rivalling the anti-trust suits in the
American courts, the Guildhall court has
decided that a sardine is any small fish
packed in oil. The action took the form
of a summons under the Merchandise
Marks Act, at the instance of a firm of
French sardine packers, against a New-
castle fishing company for falsely lab-
elling sprats as sardines. It was proved
to the satisfaction of the court that
the sardine of science is the immature
pilchard, but it was held that the name
sardine has been applied so long to any
small fish packed in a certain manner
that no action could be taken against
the Newcastle packers. Eminent counsel
were engaged on both sides and experts
ranging from famous caterers to the
fish curator of the British Museum were
summoned to give testimony.
