Household Hints

Pique

Nothing is more fashionable this
year in the way of tub fabrics for
women's and children's clothing than
pique; even linen is not more used.
There are striped piques as well as the
pure white sort and the smartest weave
has a very wide welt—almost like Bed-
ford cord. Pique shrinks in laundering
and the material should always be
shrunken and pressed before cutting a
child's garment from it. Allowance
should be made, even after the shrink-
ing, in cutting the garment, as there
will still be great shrinkage, and large
seams and deep hems should be the rule.

Vinegar is a good thing to remove
stains from zinc table tops.

If your iron sticks rub it on brown
paper which has been previously rub-
bed with yellow soap.

A little white sugar in hot water—
two lumps to a basinful—is sufficient
stiffening for delicate laces.

Starched clothes, shirts, collars, cuffs,
etc., if dried before a bright fire after
ironing, become beautifully stiff.

Linen stained by ink should be im-
mediately dipped in buttermilk. Re-
peat this until the stain disappears.

Wood alcohol is excellent to clean a
fine gold chain, if the chain is soaked
in it for half an hour and then well
brushed.

Hang sauce pan lids on nails in an airy
part of the kitchen. Never put
away pots with their lids on if you
want good cooking.

To ensure kerosene lamps giving a
clear and bright light, boil the interior
parts of the lamp in vinegar and soda
at least once in two weeks.

The most stubborn machine oil stain
may be removed if it is covered with
lard, and then, after several hours,
washed with soap and water.

If, after washing a chamois there
seem to be harsh places rub them
steadily but gently through the hands,
and soon they will quite disappear.

Wagon grease or wax spots from
candles should be scraped off and lard
applied. Benzine, naphtha gasoline and
chloroform dissolve grease.

Liquid Bluing for Clothes

Most of the prepared bluing sold is
poor and leaves specks on the clothes.
To avoid this, take best Prussian blue,
one ounce; oxalic acid pulverized, one-
half ounce; soft water, one quart; mix
thoroughly. The acid dissolves the blue
and holds it evenly in the water so that
it will never speck the clothes. One or
two tablespoonfuls is sufficient for a tub
of water, and it will not injure the
most delicate fabrics.

Hoping Against Hope At Halifax

HALIFAX, May 2.—There was held
in All Saints Cathedral, yesterday after-
noon, the simplest and most solemn
funeral service of which it has ever been
the scene. No similar service ever held
there, has given such a sense at once
of the loneliness of death and the saving
comfort in the peerless office of the
Church of England for the burial of the
dead. The funeral was that of Mr.
Harrison, secretary to Mr. Ismay, of
the White Star Company, one of the
sixteen hundred who went down to death
in the winter sea in the wreck of the
Titanic. Mr. Harrison's home was in
Liverpool.

Within the empty church, empty save
for one or two at prayer, and entirely
ignorant of the fact that the funeral
service was to be held there was the
most perfect silence, the gracious and
noble spaces breathed the peace which
"passeth understanding." The crucifix,
shining like gold, in the rays of the
western sun, spoke of "the Great
Martyr," and perfect exemplar of self-
sacrifice.

The very reverend, the Dean, con-
ducted the service, being assisted by
Rev. Canon Hind, but lately returned
from such a funeral service in the blue
northern ocean, as has made the whole
world one in pity and in mourning.
There were seven men in the cortege,
including reporters of the local agency
of the White Star Line. Neither or-
ganist nor choir was present, musical
detail wasn't needed to make the fun-
eral an impressive one. The incompar-
able words of the Psalmist were en-
forced by all the circumstances in con-
nection with this service, "For I am a
stranger with Thee and a sojourner, as
all my fathers were." Lord thou hast
been our refuge from one generation
to another before the mountains were
brought forth or even the earth and the
world were made, Thou art God, from
everlasting and world without end." It
was a brief service which none of
the half dozen present will ever forget.
The body was committed to mother
earth in tranquil Fairview cemetery.

A horrible phase of the Titanic dis-
aster has been developed here, in the
undermining of the patience and
strength of those relatives who still re-
main in Halifax, hoping against hope,
that their quest for the bodies of their
loved one, lost with the Titanic,
will be successful. The ordeal has re-
duced strong men to a state of complete
prostration but notwithstanding the
pain that their visits give them, many
still haunt the rink, in hope that the
treatment of the undertakers may make
some corpse more recognizable, or that
some belongings will be found to indi-
cate that their dead were among the
unidentified buried by the crew of the
Mackay-Bennett. At the end of each
day, since the morgue ship arrived they
have staggered out from the death hall
wrecks in body and mind, depressed by
overwhelming dejection.

"If the Minia does not arrive soon,
we shall have some of these men going
mad," said one of the policemen who
guard the rink, after helping a relative
of one of the victims to a cab. A num-
ber of the bereaved have forced them,

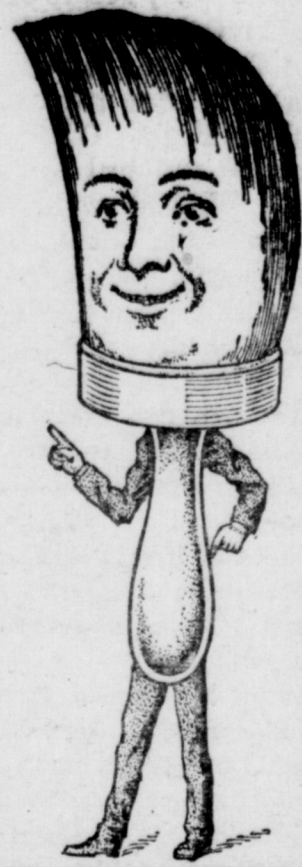

Minia with her cargo of dead is received.
MONCTON, May 2.—Mr. H. H. Mel-
anson, Assistant General Passenger
Agent of the I. C. R., returned this
morning from Halifax where he has been
supervising the transportation of the
bodies picked up by the MacKay-Ben-
net, Mr. Melanson said that everything
in connection with the arrival of the
MacKay-Bennett and the disposal of the
bodies was carried on in a systematic
manner. He said the arrival of the death
ship was a sight never to be forgotten,
with her decks piled high with coffins
and bodies. The sight of the bodies in
the morgue was a ghastly one he would
never care to witness again.

J. Bruce Ismay has taken to his bed
in New York. The strain he has been
under since the arrival of the Carpathia
is said to have caused a general break-
down, and his nervous condition is such
that no one is admitted to see him.
