


To Prevent Loss of Life at Sea


NEW YORK, April 29 .- The New York water front federation, the central organization of the unions of coastwise seaman, sea cooks, marine firemen, longshoremen and other water front workers has ordered its members to refuse to ship on steamers which have not the proyer life saving apparatus and have not an adequate equipment of lifeboats "The strike on the Olympic for more and better lifeboats," says a statement given out by the president of the federation, "has stirred up the people on this side of the Atlantic We are determined to make every effort to preventa similar loss of life to that which attended the Titanic distster"


