The Curfew Bell Will Ring Here At Nine O'clock

It is now an assured matter that Fredericton will revert to an English custom and soon will have a Curfew Bell ringing as in ye old times, and the bell will be rung each night in the summer at nine o'clock and in the winter at eight o'clock.

This matter was brought up by Ald. Guthrie at the meeting of the City Council last evening, it having been previously introduced by a delegation from the W. C. T. U. Ald. Guthrie clearly defined the seriousness of this matter and moved that the City Clerk be authorized to prepare a bye-law to the effect that the name of all children under the age of fifteen, who were found loitering on the public streets after the Curfew had been rung, be taken and their parents or guardians be fined.

As the members of the W. C. T. U. had first brought up the matter, it was decided to propose to that association that they co-operate with the churches of the city and establish a roster, one church ringing their bell at the hour above named one week and another the next and so forth.

Several of the aldermen spoke very strongly in favor of this new proposal being carried out, claiming that it would have good results, especially around the moving picture theatres, where there was generally a crowd of young people congregated every evening until the shows were over.

A Mystery Of The Sea

Among the mariners in port yesterday the fate of the 'Titanic' was discussed fully. Through loath to impute any lack of care or good judgment to the officers of the lost liner, it was easy to see that there were some features of the disaster that no theory that they might devise, save that of carelessness, would explain. The loss of the ship was to them one of the mysteries of the deep. Her hidden settling by the head and final dive to the bottom they were inclined to credit to the breaking away of her engines from their beds in the vessel.

One officer to whom a 'Witness' reporter talked to yesterday said that he had not a particle of doubt but that the engines were at the bottom of the sea a long time before the ship took her last plunge beneath the water. No boats could stand the strain very long when a ship was tilted as was the 'Titanic.' Her great engines would rain down through her hull and if one could examine that hull now, he was sure that it would be found riddled where the heavy engines had gone through it. It was the machinery breaking away that ended the career of the ship.

Another thing that officers of the incoming liners cannot understand, is why the ship's crew did not get ready life rafts for the passengers. In twenty minutes they could have prepared rafts of cabin fittings and furniture that would have kept afloat long enough to permit the saving of many lives. The only explanation that is offered is that the vessel, being a new one and the crew unused to the ship, there was a lack of the orderly system that prevails on the older liners. Blocks and ropes were stiff, and the crew strange to each other and the 'Titanic.' There is everywhere a great desire manifested by the mariners coming to the port to lay no blame on the dead officers of the lost liner, but there are some conclusions that even the friends of the late sailors cannot escape.

LATEST ABOUT RADIUM
Inexhaustibility of Radium Emanation Has Been Disproved.

Scarcely twelve years have elapsed since Professor and Madame Curie, by a painstaking and laborious process, succeeded in isolating the radioactive substance from a large mass of mineral having radio-active properties, and to it the name radium was given. This discovery was followed by fantastic theories and elaborate hypotheses brought about by the desire of physicists to account for the wonderful properties of the new substance without doing violence to existing laws. Here was a phenomenon which had to be reconciled to existing laws of energy, though apparently it transgressed the fundamental law of the conservation of energy. Radium gave off energy day by day and year by year without apparent exhaustion or even diminution in radiating power; and not a few of our leading physicists were ready to disown the law of the conservation of energy under the formidable evidence presented by the untoward phenomenon of this new substance; but recent researches have shown that this barrier to the full acceptance of the law of the conservation of energy has broken down, and that radium slowly wastes away by the dissipation of its energy just as a furnace unreplenished with fuel will eventually lose its radiating power. The extreme slowness of the decline in radiating power of radium was the cause of the first incorrect assumptions regarding it; but under the experimental skill of such men as Professors Soddy, Dewar, and Rutherford the apparent inexhaustibility of radium emanation has been disproved; and instead of a substance possessed of an inexhaustible store of energy, it may now be regarded as a body possessed of great concentrated energy, which it allows to escape slowly and persistently, and in this respect it fits in with the existing order. As we learn more about it we find that there is less occasion to modify our previous ideas of energy in general.

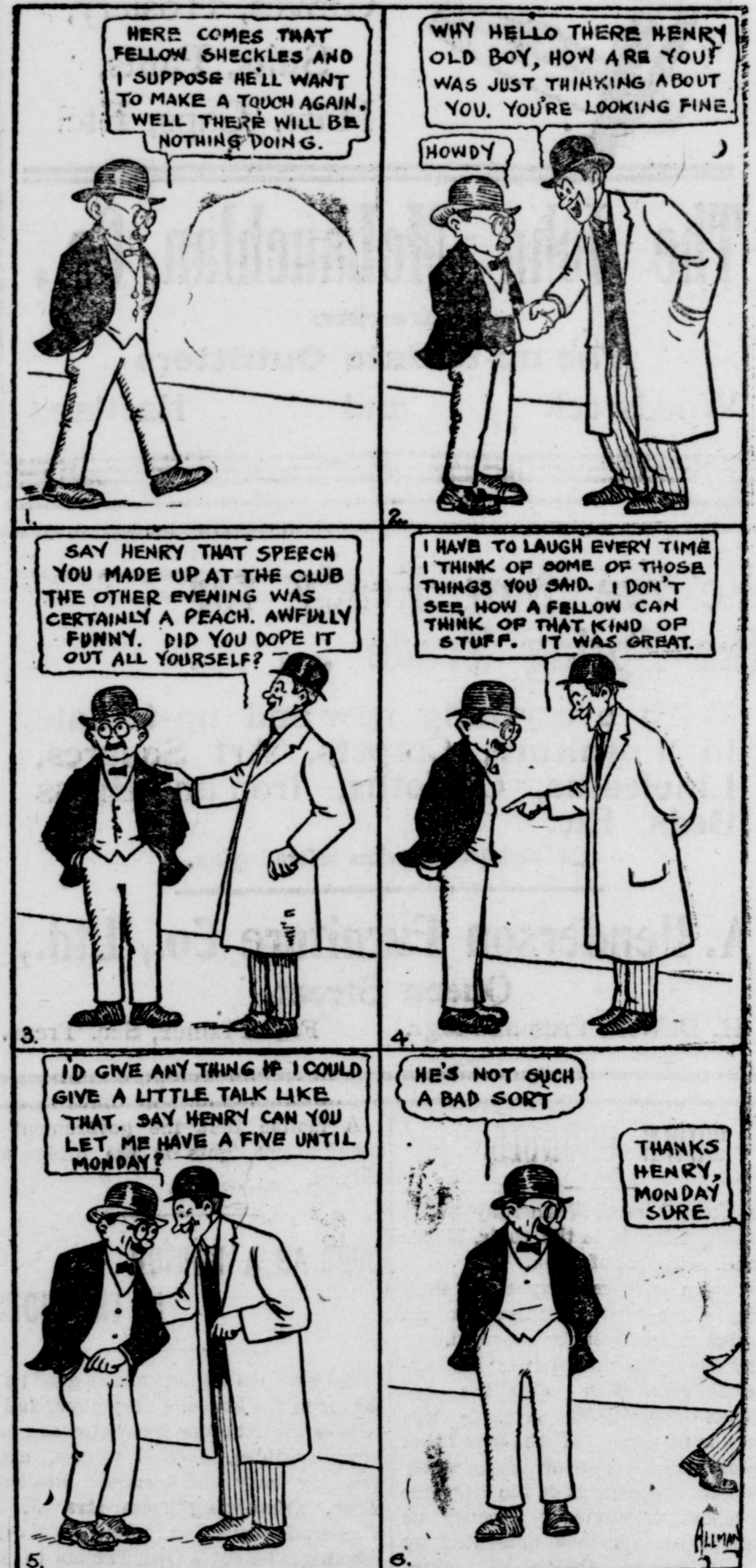
