THE FIGHTING TURK

He is a great fighter because he is physically a strong man. The Turkish peasantry, from whom the Army is recruited, have to work hard for a bare living, and there is no room among them for weaklings. Therefore, the Turkish soldier is capable of tremendous feats of endurance, and can live on nothing, or next door to it. Then he is accustomed to fighting almost from babyhood. On the frontiers and in the country districts of Turkey there is always trouble going on.

Death in battle has no terrors for him, for by his religion it assures him of paradise.

Burmese Spells.

Some curious sidelights on the Burman's character are contained in a report on the work of the Archaeological Survey in Burmah. It is stated that the Burman highly prizes the following gems—ruby, diamond or crystal, pearl, coral, topaz, sapphire, cat's eye, amethyst, and emerald. Collectively they ward off sickness or danger. The cat's eye is supposed to secure invulnerability in war. Incantations are muttered over some or all of these stones and the water in which they are immersed is drunk in order to secure immunity from all evil. Spells are uttered over values, and they are inserted as amulets in the flesh of men who desire to be immune from wounds inflicted by sword, spear, or gun.
