Therefore, the Turkish soldier is capable of tremendous feats of endurance, and can live on nothing, or next door to it. Then he is accustomed to fighting almost from babyhood. On the frontiers and in the country districts of Turkey there is always trouble going on.

#### Burmese Spells.

Some curious sidelights on the Burman's character are contained in a report on the work of the Archaelogical Survey in Burmah.
