TOWN COUNCIL

Town Council met in special session at 8 o'clock on Friday night, continuing until midnight.

There were present Mayor Ketchum and a full board.

Auditor Leighton and Building Inspector Green were heard before the board. The consideration of their reports was postponed until a subsequent meeting, and the usual salary was voted the auditor.

The council went into committee of the whole on the estimates, rose at 11 o'clock and reported.

In discussing the estimates it was brought out that several important improvements will be made in the town service during the year.

Coun. Mair intends rewiring the town light service with some six miles of new wire at a cost of about \$800; he will be allowed \$200 for the old wire, making the net cost about \$600. This is necessary in order to have an allnight light service during the construction of the Valley railway.

Coun. Gibson intends attaching a striker of the latest model, to the bell at a cost of about \$500. He will also purchase the usual amount of new hose. Two cars of green hard wood will be bought by him for use during the next year.

Coun. Gallagher will have Engineer Feeney of Fredericton here in a few days to get advice before starting permanent street work. The visitor is an expert road maker and has kindly consented to start the work right. He will visit the plant and meet with the Council before work is commenced.

Coun. Dibblee intends laying a lot of new sewers this year, even more applications coming in than the appropriations will warrant in laying.

Moved by Couns. Jones and Balmain and passed that the report of committee of the whole be adopted and that a warrant for \$40,000 issue.

Coun. Jones resigned his position as a delegate with the mayor to inspect the Calais public library and Coun. Balmain was appointed in his place.

In the miscellaneous account in the estimates appears a grant for the band as well as for the publicity campaign conducted by the board of trade.

The White Star Liner Titanic, the greatest steamer ever built, struck an iceberg 400 miles south of Cape Race, Sunday night at 10.25 p. m., and four hours later sank with 1300 of the 2200 that sailed from Liverpool on her.

Details from wireless reports are meagre, but the White Star officials admit the greatest marine disaster in the world's history.

The survivors are aboard the steamer Carpathia bound to New York.
