Child's Dress.

The waist of this dress is a long, straight shirt blouse, with two little tucks running lengthwise on each side of the front and also of the back from the shoulder to the belt. In the centre of the front there is a band in which buttonholes are worked and the dress buttoned together. The same closing continues down the centre front of the skirt. This has almost no fulness and is attached to the waist beneath the belt. The sleeves may be full length or cut off at the elbow.

This design is suitable for linen, pique, gingham, cambie and many other wash materials.

Coffee From Figs

Ever since coffee has been a popular beverage, apparently, efforts have been made to find substitutes for it, either as mere adulterants, like chicory, or for the sake of greater wholesomeness or cheapness. Rye and other grains, lupine, acorns, beets and carrots have all been thus used, but the fig coffee of Austria is a decided novelty. An excellent coffee it is claimed to be made from dried and roasted figs, which need not be of the first quality.

They are dried in the sun or in evaporating pans, according to climate, and then roasted in ovens till brown or almost black and quite brittle. They are then ground up and the resultant powder is pressed into tablets. When made use of they are merely dissolved in hot water. The beverage is said to be agreeable in color and flavor with a somewhat sweeter taste than that made from chicory.

Cornish, N. H. Both Misses Eleanor and Margaret Wilson, daughters of the President, are to appear in connection with the masque. BLIND MEN WHO HAVE OVERCOME THEIR HANDICAP.

Walker King, an Englishman who has been blind from birth, rides regularly to hounds. With such skill does he manage his mount, says the London Chronicle, that no one unacquainted with the fact would imagine that he was blind. Futhermore Mr. King is one of the best judges of horses and cattle in the United Kingdom. So beautifully tuned in his sense of touch that by merely running his hand over a horse he can detect all his points with the precision of the veterinary surgeon who has all his faculties. Besides being an ardent sportsman, Mr. King is a keen politician, and has contested three seats in the Liberal interest. Mr. King had an aunt, Miss Alice King, who though, like her nephew, totally blind, was a well-known writer of novels. She became an expert typist, and the whole of her stories were typed by herself. The Rev. Walker King, the father of the blind sportsman, is nearly blind, and has long since retired from active work, but at present is taking church duties at Cutcombe for the vicar, who is ill.

Another notable case is that of Mr. Gore who, despite his blindness, secured an excellent education, and is today one of the leading members of the United States Senate.

Canada's Exports Increasing

According to statistics compiled by the Department of Customs, presided over by Hon J D Reid, the volume of exports of manufactured articles from the Dominion is increasing rapidly. For the first four months of the present fiscal year ending July 31st, last, Canada exported \$16,051,000 worth of manufactured goods, compared with \$12,659,000 worth for the corresponding period of 1912.

The exports of fish are also rapidly increasing. For the first four months of the present fiscal year \$5,032,000 worth of fish were exported as against \$3,748,000 worth for the first four months of the fiscal year 1912.

The products of the forest and mine also show large increases in volume of export. Of minerals we exported \$17,180,000 worth and of forest products \$14,171,000 worth. These figures are considerably in excess of the exports for 1912 for the same period.

Washington, Sept. 9.—The Democratic tariff revision bill passed the Senate at 5.43 o'clock this afternoon by a vote of 44 to 37, amid a burst of applause that swept down from the crowded galleries and found its echo on the crowded floor of the Senate. Its passage was attended with surprises in the final moments of the voting, when Senator La Follette, Republican, cast his vote with the Democrats, and was joined a few moments later by Senator Poindexter, Progressive.

Corn Relish.

Eighteen ears of corn, one onion, one cabbage, one-quarter pound of mustard, one pint of vinegar, four cupfuls of sugar, one-half cupful of salt, two peppers. Cut the corn, from the cob, chop onion, peppers and cabbage, add sugar, salt and vinegar, and cook slowly three-quarters of an hour. Ten minutes before taking from the fire add a very scant fourth of a pound of dissolved mustard. Seal in glass jars.

Celery Pickle.

Cut three dozen heads of celery in small pieces, shred two heads of white cabbage, and slice 12 green peppers and the same number of red ones. Soak the green peppers in vinegar before adding to the rest of the ingredients. Add, also, two dozen very small white onions or six large ones sliced, and pack all in an earthen jar. Place in layer, with salt between until the jar is full. Put a plate with a heavy weight on it on the top and leave in press for three days. Drain thoroughly. Have ready a dressing made by mixing a half pound of ground mustard with a large cup of olive oil, one cupful of sugar, half an ounce each of mace, ginger, allspice and clove; half a pound of white mustard seed and a table-spoon of turmeric. Mix this dressing well through the prepared vegetables and pour over them hot vinegar enough to cover. Keep in a jar in a cool place for a week, then fill glass jars with the pickle, adding more vinegar to each jar. Seal.

In an experimental test track near Janesville, Wis., an inspection just made showed that hemlock and tamarack ties put in the track without preservation treatment were decayed after five and a half years' service. Those which had been treated were practically as good as when first laid.

The Prince of Monaco arrived at New York on Tuesday night from Halifax and intends to stay during the autumn. He expects to occupy most of his time studying some of the larger American universities.

Mexico's Sad Plight.

Ex-President Diaz, who ruled Mexico for 30 years, was a despot, and he undoubtedly used his position to enrich himself. But he at least gave the country peace, and with peace came prosperity. Since his overthrow there has been continuous warfare. Railways, roads, factories, mines and farms have been laid waste; cities and towns have been destroyed; worst of all a people who were becoming habituated to peace have become accustomed again to the wild freedom of guerilla warfare. It will probably be years before the country will settle down to peaceful conditions. The difficulties in the situation have been further aggravated by the disorganization of the National finances. Sixty two per cent of the national revenues, Current Opinions tells us, have been pledged for the payment of debt already incurred. To secure a new loan of \$100,000,000, negotiated by Huerta, but held up pending recognition of his Government by the United States, the remaining thirty-eight per cent of the national revenues have been pledged. The total of the debt incurred is not large for a country with Mexico's resources. It is only \$300,000,000, but with the country laid waste, and the national revenues all pledged to foreign bondholders, it is a very heavy handicap and will make the establishment of stable government a matter of great difficulty, even if the co-operation of a people ready for peace could be assured.
