Terms of Allies To End The War.

SOFIA, March 14.—The Balkan allies will accept European mediation on the following condition:

First—As a basis of negotiations for delimitation of the territory between Turkey and the Balkan allies a line shall be drawn from Rodos to on the sea of Mar-

mora to Cape Malatra seven miles south of Midia on the Black Sea, excluding the peninsula of Gallipoli, which shall remain to Turkey. All territories west of the line including Adrianople and Scutari, shall be ceded by Turkey to the allies.

Second—Turkey shall cede the islands in the Aegean Sea to the allies.

Third—Turkey shall renounce all her interests in the Island of Crete.

Fourth—The Porte shall consent in principle to the payment of a war indemnity, the amount of which shall be fixed when peace has been concluded and also to the payment of private individuals of compensation for damage caused prior to the war. The allies shall participate in the deliberations regarding the indemnities.

Fifth—The allies reserve the right to settle by definite treaty of peace the terms to be accorded to their subjects and to their trade in the Ottoman empire as well as the guarantees to be given regarding the privileges of the orthodox churches and the legal standing of their racial brothers who are Ottoman subjects.

The military operations shall not be interrupted.

Violent Tosses On Sea And Land.

NEW YORK, March 14.—Two men are missing, believed to have been drowned, as the result of a harbor collision last night in which a steam lighter, The Wyckoff, was run down and cut in two by an unidentified vessel, thought to be a laden tugboat. Jess Rawson, a negro, was found clinging to a broken boom in the water. The lighter was bound up Long Island Sound from Perth Amboy, N. J. She was off Governor's Island when the other vessel loomed through the darkness.

BUENOS AYRES, Argentina, March 14.—Many people were killed or injured by a destructive cyclone which struck this city today. Great damage was caused to property.

OMAHA, Neb., March 14.—Union Pacific passenger train No. 12, known as the Colorado Special ran into the rear of No. 4, the Atlantic express, this morning, near Gothenburg, Neb., killing four persons and injuring thirty more, according to advices reaching here.

New York, March 14.—The death list in the storm that swept several southern states yesterday was raised to thirty-three early this morning. The latest reports of life loss came near Atlanta, where five were killed.

COLUMBUS, Ga., March 14.—A storm of cyclonic proportions struck Columbus early today causing damage estimated at several thousand dollars. Two persons were reported killed. Buildings of the Eagle and Pabst Mills and the Swift Manufacturing Company were partly demolished. Residences were blown down and street traffic demoralized.

ATLANTA, March 14.—Five known dead, at least a score injured and thousands of dollars loss today marked the path of the rain and hail storm which swept the section just east of the city last night. The storm cut a swath about one hundred yards wide and extended through DeKalb County today and the section is entirely cut off from wire communication and later reports, it is feared, will swell the list of casualties. The dead include: William Banks and child, Clarkston; Mrs. Sallie Nash and son, and an unidentified negro. Relief parties were sent out from here early today.

ROME, Ga., March 14.—Eighteen are reported dead and many more injured as the result of the storm which swept over Northwest Georgia last night. The property damage was very heavy.

Good Roads Bill To Be Introduced.

FREDERICTON, March, 14—

This afternoon or on Monday a bill to amend the Highways Act will be introduced by Hon. John Morrissey, Chief Commissioner of Public Works. The amendment will provide for doing away with the Highway Boards and there will be a provincial engineer of highways and a county inspector to take charge of the work. A provision will probably be contained to make it necessary to have statute labor performed before a certain date, otherwise taxes will be collected.

The House will not sit on Saturday. It was decided today to devote Saturday to sessions of the government, which has some important matters pending. It is expected that the House will be prorogued about Thursday next, with the usual busy and rushing wind-up.

Germany.

The pace set in military and naval expenditure by Germany leads to enormous expenditures by other great powers of Europe, and is driving them to great straits in order that they may maintain the position they at present hold. This is more or less embarrassing to all the nations, but Germany is suffering some of the consequences of the course she is pursuing. Last week the government attempted to float a loan of \$100,000,000 at four per cent, and less than half the proposed amount was subscribed. The amount taken up was only \$42,500,000, and part of this sum was a renewal of old treasury notes. The loan is a flat failure—the first experience of the German empire in that way. The explanation is said to be that the people are opposed to the vast increase in military expenditure. The proposed new taxes are appalling, and the rich particularly the landed classes will especially suffer. Adding \$50,000,000 a year to the burdens of the people for war purposes, and demanding \$250,000,000 from those who possess bank accounts of \$5,000, is a programme to stagger the nation when the country is at peace. What will happen should war break out? It is no wonder that the despatches speak of a war picnic, and describe how the people are bankrupt, Bankruptcies are common, and the banks are slow in lending money.

A lady pleads for the abolition of the phrase "middle-aged" on the ground that it is out of date.

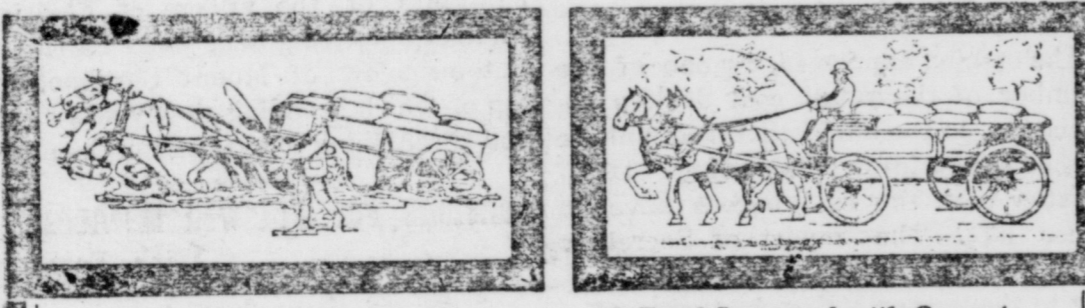
