Suffragettes Break More Windows.

LONDON, March 14—The latest exploit of the militant suffragettes in London is the obliteration of the names on the gate post of houses in the residential streets. Armed with pots of paint or tins and brushes they raided the Richmond district in this way in the course of last night, disfiguring many houses. The window-smashing campaign also was resumed this morning by the suffragettes. A Jeweller's store on Pond street and a prominent shop in Holborn suffered from their attentions. Hammers were used in both cases. The police arrested several of the women while engaged in the work. Olive Hocken, who was remanded yesterday on a charge of attempting to set fire to a pavilion on the Rushmore Golf Links, was released to-day on bail of \$2,500, on undertaking to abstain from militancy pending her trial.

Home secretary McKenna, in the House of Commons yesterday, replied to the question of J. King, of which notice was given on Wednesday, as to the effect of pump-feeding on the suffragettes and whether it would not be a good idea of applying dugong oil where the women went on hunger strikes. The minister said he understood that cod liver oil had often been applied for malnutrition in infants but he was doubtful as to its success; anyhow the prolongation of life by such means would be very limited. Mr. King retorted that he had heard of many cases where lives had been saved by dugong oil. It was different from cod liver oil. It had a much more pungent smell.

This last remark created much laughter.

VICEROY OF INDIA ON HIS ATTEMPTED ASSASSINATION.

(Springfield Republican.)
Fine and dignified was the address of the Viceroy of India, Lord Hardinge, at his first appearance before the Legislative Council at Delhi after a recent attempt upon his life. He appeared with his arm in a sling and was suffering greatly from wounds not yet healed, but he felt compelled to open the first session, and among other things he said:

"When five weeks ago I recovered consciousness and was able to think over what had passed, my feelings were in the first instance those of profound gratitude to Almighty God for His merciful protection of Lady Hardinge and myself, of real grief for the man who lost his life in the performance of his duty, of very deep disappointment that it was possible that such misguided men as those who plotted and committed such a useless crime could now be found in India, and sorrow at the thought of the injury to the sentiments of the whole of India, who would I knew regard with horror and detestation the perpetration of a crime which is contrary to their own precepts, to the instincts of humanity and loyalty, as well as to their religious principles."

That temper helps to explain the English empire, which finds men to carry it on quite equal to the men who made it.

A fine of \$500 a minister, clergyman or other person who solemnizes marriage while either of the parties to it, is under the influence of liquor or if he has reason to believe either of the parties is an idiot or insane. He shall also be liable to imprisonment for any period not exceeding twelve months.

The bill further provides that the issuer of the marriage licenses if he has knowledge or reason to believe that either of the parties to the marriage is an idiot, insane, epileptic or imbecile, shall require the applicant to leave with him a doctor's certificate to the effect that neither of the parties is deficient mentally as stated above, and if the applicant does not do so, he is to refuse the license. The issuer of licenses who is guilty of an infraction of the law is to be liable to a fine of \$500 and imprisonment for twelve months.

The bill further requires that the issuer of marriage licenses on receiving an application is to put up a notice containing the names of the parties and keep it posted up three weeks before the license is issued.

Compulsory Military Training In Australia

London, March 15.—A Sydney N. S. W. despatch to the Daily News this morning indicates that the Australian Methodist are sharply divided over the question of compulsory military training. After some heated discussion at the Methodist Conference held there yesterday, a motion condemning "conscription" was only defeated by the casting vote of the chairman.

The estimated amount which the House of Commons is to be asked to appropriate this year for the expenditure on the British army is \$141,500,000 against \$139,300,000 last year, an increase of \$1,800,000. The sum of \$1,170,000 is to be devoted to aviation.

An Unsinkable Ship

Harland and Wolfe Have Realized It in White Star Olympic.

London, March 12.—A Belfast despatch to the Evening News says: "One of the most wonderful shipbuilding feats ever known has nearly been finished on the White Star liner Olympic. The nature of the work has thus far been kept secret, but I am now able to say that Harland and Wolfe are constructing an enormous steel shell inside her hull. It extends nearly the full length of the ship, from number three bulkhead forward to the rear turbine room aft."

"If she collided with an iceberg, as her sister the Titanic did, and her hull were ripped off by a slanting blow, she would not sink. The inner shell would keep her afloat almost as if nothing had happened. It would be the same if she ran into a submerged rock."

"Harland and Wolfe's naval architects believe that they have realized the quest of an unsinkable ship,

China Threatened With Flour Famine.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 18.—Simultaneously with the awaking of China, a shortage in the world's supply of flour and the raw product for breadstuffs is threatened, according to George Bury, vice-president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, who has just returned on the liner Siberia from a visit to the Orient. Within a single year the demand for flour for China has emptied many of the big grain elevators of the Northwest, and the flour mills have been in operation day and night to prepare the commodity for the hungry millions of the new China, according to Mr. Bury.

Charge School Board Graft

Vancouver, B. C., March 14.—R. G. Miller, bookkeeper employed by D. Matheson, contractor, gave sensational evidence before the court held to inquire into charges of graft against school board officials.

Miller said he kept an account marked "B and C," which was short for "Bribery and Corruption." He further stated that \$2,000 had been divided between C. W. Murry, secretary of the school board, and former Architect Leach, in consideration of an \$85,000 contract being awarded Matheson.

Turks Are Ready To Surrender Adrianople.

LONDON, March 18.—A telegram from Sofia reports that the garrison at Adrianople has offered to surrender on conditions of being allowed the honors of war and permitted to keep their arms. The Bulgarians, however, have not accepted these conditions.

Higher Coal Prices.

(Boston Advertiser.)

The opinion expressed, by one of the member of the retail coal dealers association, to the effect that coal will be higher next winter is alarming. It indicates that the coal barons have no sense left. The report of Secretary Nagel that the advances in wages owing to the recent strike had amounted to \$4,000,000 and that the mine owners had used this as an excuse for advancing the price to the consumer an aggregate of nearly \$14,000,000, is something which has made the country thoughtful on the coal situation. Indignation will soon break out against any such unfair tax on the consumer, as a further raise in price would be. If the owners of the coal mines have any prejudice in their natures, they will stop raising prices before they have made the people of the country desperate.

LONDON, March 17.—The treaty between the United States and Nicaragua by which Nicaragua gives to the United States in perpetuity the exclusive right of way for an interoceanic canal across Nicaraguan territory, but which

A panic has broken out among the inhabitants of the village of Flourier, Switzerland, lying near Lake Leuchate, in the shadow of Mount Caroline, the top of which is sliding slowly downward and threatening to overwhelm the place.

Pensions For Widowed Mothers With Families

London, Ont., March 18.—On the advice of Dr. Hugh Stevenson, the Women's Canadian Club and the Union Mother's Club of the city will petition the Dominion government to grant a per capita pension to widowed mothers with families.

At a meeting held at the Normal School the doctor called the attention of Canadian Club members to the number of mothers who were being left without means of support in the city. He urged that the question receive prompt attention.

Dr. Stevenson claimed that the best plan to follow would be to request the government to grant a standard pension to mothers of families. In this way, he claimed, mothers would be able to stay at home, to read their families in a proper manner and as a result save millions to the country by the prevention of the rearing of lawless men and women.
