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Woodstock Agricultural Society.

The Carleton County agricultural society held a meeting in the Town Hall on Saturday afternoon. There was the largest attendance for many years, the town hall being crowded with members.

C. L. Smith, the president, presided, and the secretary, A. D. Helyoke, was also present.

The committee appointed to look up land for agricultural buildings and a race track, reported that they could get land from A. B. Connell, part of the J. M. Connell land, for a rental of \$200 a year. Ten acres of the Bull land could be purchased for \$4000 and 10 acres from C. L. Smith for \$2,000. Mr. Colpitts offered suitable land for \$3,000.

A motion was passed that in the opinion of the meeting a trotting park should be connected with the agricultural buildings.

The committee was continued to look into the matter still further and report at a meeting to be held on Saturday afternoon, two weeks hence.

She leaves two brothers, Howard A. and Steen, at Westfield, and five sisters, Miss Grace and Miss May at home, Mrs. William Earle, of New Denver, Mrs. Hubert Seely, of Woodstock, N. B., and Mrs. Mabee, in the west.

Precisely at 730 p. m. the bride, leaning on the arm of her father, enter the parlor to the strains of the wedding march as played by Miss Alice Lunn, cousin of the groom. Miss Mildred Lunn was bridesmaid, while Lewis Lunn, brother of the groom, was best man. The bride looked charming in a costume of white satin de chene silk with bead trimmings. She wore the customary bridal veil. The bridesmaid wore a dress of cream serge trimmed with white satin. The many presents of linen, china, cut glass, cash, etc., showed that the bride was attended by many friends. The groom's present to the bride was a handsome gold locket and chain.

Mr W T Whitehead Died this Morning

Fredericton, Nov. 28.—After an illness extending over a period of more than five years, and which had been critical for some weeks past, Mr. W. T. Whitehead, former manager of the New Brunswick Railway Company's land, and for two terms a representative of York county in the legislative assembly, died at his home on Church street about nine o'clock this morning. Had he lived out the present calendar year, deceased would have been 62 years old, having been born at Dumfries, York county, on January 1st, 1852.

In 1872 he was appointed manager of the lands for the New Brunswick Railway company, and continued in that capacity for thirty-eight years

until his retirement in 1910, having become a vice-president of the company, in which Lord Strathcona and the late Robert Meighen were among those largely interested. Mr. Whitehead was for many years one of the most prominent figures in the Liberal party in York Co., politics. In 1895, he was a member of the unsuccessful Liberal ticket, but he was elected four years later at the general elections in 1899, and was re-elected in 1903. In 1908 he secured the Liberal nomination for the then approaching federal elections, but he later retired owing to ill-health.

Besides his wife, who was formerly Miss Frances C. Crawford, of Hampton, N. B., and whom he married in 1877., he is survived by two sons, Guy B., now in the Shushanna gold fields and Stephen B., in Vancouver, B. C., two daughters, Mrs. A. H. McKee, of Ottawa, and Mrs. F. S. Shute, of Yarmouth, N. S., and two sisters, Mrs. George A. Burkhardt and Miss Alfaretta Whitehead, now of San Diego, California.

FREDERICTON, Dec. 1.—

The funeral of Mr. W. Turney Whitehead, took place this afternoon from his late residence on Church street, and was largely attended. The services at the house were conducted by Rev. Neil McLaughlin, pastor of the Methodist Church, assisted by Rev. G. M. Campbell, of Sackville, and Very Rev. Dean Schofield, of Christ Church Cathedral. In the procession the deceased's private horse, carriage and driver had a place immediately behind the mourners.

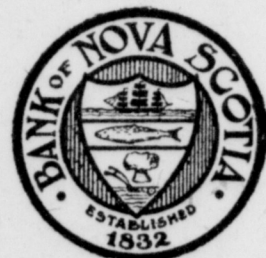
