The Growth of Buenos Ayres

All the great cities, Buenos Ayres is to be growing the most rapidly. The most artistically built of the cities of the new world, it reminds the visitor of Madrid or Paris. This magnificent capital of the Argentine Republic had in 1800 only 40,000 inhabitants; in 1852, 70,000; in 1859, 137,000; in 1877, 429,000; in 1895, 655,000; in 1904, 951,000; the census of 1910 brought it up to 1,282,117 while the population since that time has grown astonishingly. The Mayor, in a recent public speech, said that in four years the population of Buenos Ayres, at the present rate of growth, would surpass that of Paris.

Notice Of Legislation.

Non-Productive Areas

Professor C. A. Zavitz, Guelph, in the course of an address, said that Canadian agriculture was showing more and more the effects of the work of a well educated and highly intellectual people. Turning to the high cost of living, he said this was due in no small measure to the prevailing practice of few men operating farms of large area. The increase in the number of people engaging in non-productive occupations must necessarily be accompanied by a high market price for products of the farm. It would be much better for the people themselves, the city and the country if many at present living in Canadian cities were back on the farms.
