Non-Productivo Areas

Professor C. A. Zavi., Guelph, in the course of an address mid that Canadian agriculture was showing more and more the effects of the work of a well educated and highly intellectual people. Traing to the high cost of living he said this was due in no small measure to the prevailing practice of few men operating farms of large area. The increase in the number of people engaging in non-producdive occupations must necessarily be accompanied by a higher market prices for products of the tarm. It would be much better for the people themselves, the city and the country if many at present living in Canadian cities were back on the farms.
