TYPHOID EPIDEMIC

HITS St. MARYS

A big epidemic of typhoid fever has struck St. Marys, resulting, it is said from water used from the wells of the people stricken, not the water as supplied by the corporation's water system. Samples of the water from wells have been sent to Montreal, and a report has been received stating that the water is contaminated and to discontinue the use of it. There are 15 or more cases of typhoid at St. Marys.

To Produce Seed In New Brunswick For The Alfalfa

The Provincial Department of Agriculture has completed arrangements for carrying on a series of experiments in connection with the growing of alfalfa in New Brunswick.

This morning Mr. J. B. Daggett secretary for agriculture, announced that the department had been notified of the acceptance of the offer made to Mrs. F. Coates, of Boston, for a plot of seven or eight acres of land at Havelock, Kings county, which had been selected for carrying on the experiments.

The experiments will continue over a period of five years, and it is hoped to produce New Brunswick grown seed of a hardy nature such as will insure the success of alfalfa grown in this province, experts declaring that with home seed New Brunswick will be well suited for growing alfalfa. The seed for carrying on the first experiments will be brought from North Dakota.

CANADA AND STATES ARE NOW PLAYING FOOTBALL.

Toronto, Sept. 12— Official notice has reached Mr. Tom Robertson, secretary of the Dominion of Canada Football Association, from C. A. W. Hirschman, secretary of the International Football Federation, that the United States of America Football Association has been admitted to membership. This will now allow of Canadian and United States teams meeting under the same rules and will complete the federation scope of control around the globe.
