HOUSEHOLD.

Tomato Marmalade.—Peel and chop
ripe, firm tomatoes, allowing for each
pound the grated yellow rind of a lemon.
Boil together till the tomatoes are soft,
when to each pint add the juice of a le-
mon and a pound of sugar. Cook for
about a half hour or until it will jelly
when placed on a chilled plate. Put
away as with other marmalade.

Tomato Honey.—Prepare as for the mar-
malade, using, however, the small yel-
low tomatoes and straining through a
bag when thoroughly cooked and soft-
ened. Peach leaves or stones, or bitter
almonds are sometimes used to flavor
the marmalade and honey, or some tart
fruit other than lemon, as barberries,
cranberries, etc., or ginger, is added
with the lemon.

Red Tomato Preserve.—Peel large,
ripe, smooth tomatoes without scalding
and remove the seeds with a spoon.
Measure and place in a preserving ket-
tle with equal measure of sugar, two
lemons sliced and one cup of chopped
rhubarb. Cook till the tomatoes are
translucent; place in jars and pour over
them the syrup.

The Season's Skirts.
The general shape of the season's
skirts is that of a piece of pie, ex-
tremely narrow about the feet, with
slits for the sake of freedom, and
abundantly draped about the hips,
where material galore is used in the
fashioning. Japanese touches are
seen in the draping and in the enor-
mous bows into which the material is
draped up behind. A peculiar perva-
sion of the usual order this season is
that of using broadcloth to decorate
chiffon. Skirts of chiffon draped with
broadcloth are, to say the least, un-
usual.

Fall Millinery Runs to Colors.
A despatch from Paris says that the
fall dress exhibitions there indicate
that feminine fashiondom has gone
color mad, the latest creations of the
dressmakers being a riot of brilliant
tints. Apparently there are going to
be some gay sights all over the world
shortly, for the following of Paris in
gowns is universal. The aurore bor-
ealis and the rainbow should look to
their laurels.

Red Bottles for Milk.
Milk spoils quickly when kept
in a strong light, and investiga-
tors have found that the rays of
light near the violet end of the
spectrum seem to have the most
detrimental effect. Strong light
acts in the same manner upon steri-
lized milk and upon pasteurized
milk as upon pure, fresh milk: af-
ter being exposed in plain glass
bottle to full sunlight for a day
all three kinds of milk were found
to be completely spoiled and unfit
for use. On the other hand, says
the Scientific American, red rays
are beneficial, and milk that is put
in bottles of red glass, or in bottles
wrapped with red paper, will keep
in good condition much longer
than milk bottled in glass that per-
mits the passage of all the light-
waves.
