THE EDUCATIONAL CONFERENCE OVER

Agricultural Education is the principal subject under consideration at the conference which is being held at the education offices between Dr. W. S. Carter, the chief superintendent of education, and the School inspectors of the Province.

The opening session Thursday morning was devoted to district difficulties and betterment together with a short address and exemplifications of physical Training and the best manner to deal with it by Mr. A. S. McFarlane, director of Physical Training at the normal School.

Thursday afternoon the following subjects suggested by Director Steeves regarding Agricultural Education were discussed.

1 Parish associations of teachers and trustees and ratepayers, with a view of gaining interest in school and home problems.

2 Plans for carrying out systematic and permanent improvement of school grounds.

3 Use of reference collection of Economic and Wood Seeds supplied by Agricultural Department at Ottawa, and care of same; also of "Farm Weeds of Canada," provided some years ago.

4 Encouragement of experimental plots by pupils either at home or in school garden.

5 Simple practical experimental work done by pupils—relation being had to the needs and capabilities of the district.

6 Use of weights and measures. The geography of the district.

The morning was devoted to concluding the discussion of the subjects regarding Agricultural Education and a consideration of Technical Education under the leadership of Mr. J. E. Peacock, Director of Manual Training in New Brunswick. The conference will close this afternoon.

Parish Clerk to post names of Candidates in three of the most public places in each Polling District on or before Thursday, the 9th day of October next.

Candidates names also to be posted up at the Polling Places before the opening of poll on day of election.

The Parish Clerk or District Clerk (as the case may be) to act as Chairman, unless he refuses to serve, or is absent, or not competent by reason of relationship of candidate, when chairman to be chosen by electors present.

Assessors are required to furnish Parish clerks with list of electors.
