New York Storm-Bound on the Day Before Christmas

New York, Dec. 25.—One million more telephone calls than the normal day's business, which is about 2,000,000 calls, was the result of the day before Christmas, business and the storm which struck the city yesterday, according to a report of the New York Telephone Company. With street traffic blocked or difficult, everyone seemed to turn to the wire as the best way out. The increase in call is unprecedented in the city's history.

Christmas Snowfall in New England.

Boston, Dec. 26.—A blanket of snow, ranging from two feet in the south to scarcely a trace in the north, made Christmas in New England a white one for the first time in three years. The weather however, was a repetition of the Indian summer conditions which prevailed last year—for it was clear, calm and warm throughout the day.

On Nantucket Island the natives spent the day in digging out from under a thick blanket of snow, and in an endeavor to re-establish communication by water with different parts of the island and with the mainland.

Investigating the Oatmeal Business.

Chicago, Dec. 24.—Investigation of an alleged attempt to obtain control of the oatmeal business of the United States has been started by the federal grand jury here. It is learned to-day. The purchase of the Great Western Cereal Co. by the Quaker Oats Co., would be

acquired into first. Robert Gordon, secretary of the Quaker Oats Co., and Daniel Peterkin, private secretary to Joy Morton, head of the Great Western Co., have been ordered to appear before the grand jury. A number of other employes have been subpoenaed.

King George Was Not Well Yesterday

London, Dec. 26.—King George who is staying at his country house at Sandringham, was unable on account of a chill, to attend church on Christmas Day and was prevented from attending the Christmas dinner given by Queen Mother Alexandra. It is officially stated today that His Majesty has quite recovered.

Whittier Relics Destroyed Or Damaged

Amesbury, Mass., Dec. 26.—Relics of the poet, John Greenleaf Whittier, including autograph letters from notables all over the world and manuscripts, were burned or seriously damaged by smoke and water yesterday in a fire which partly consumed the building occupied by the Whittier house association. The fire is supposed to have started from the furnace.

Austria To stop War Preparations

London, Dec. 26.—A St. Petersburg despatch to the Daily Mail says: "According to reliable information, Austria has decided to discontinue her military preparations and disband her reservists."

London, Dec. 26.—M. Mihu, the new Roumanian minister, arrived in London last night. He had an interview with Dr. Danft, the head of the Bulgarian peace delegation, at which Roumania's demands for compensation and the relations between Roumania and Bulgaria are said to have been discussed in a friendly spirit.

London, Dec. 26.—The Vienna correspondent of the Times says that although Christmas leave was given to some of the reservist officers there has been no slackening of the military precautions.

A Salonika despatch to the Times says that in view of the determined stand the Turks are making at Janina a fourth Greek division is now embarking for Preveza.

A Constantinople despatch to the Times says that further complements of Turkish troops from the Black Sea provinces have arrived at the Dardanelles, where

more than 40,000 are now concentrated.

According to the latest information Djavid Pasha and his whole staff were killed by shrapnel during an attack by the Turks on the Hellenic position east of Gritze, about Dec. 16.

Fighting continues in the Janina district.

London, Dec. 26.—The possession of the Turkish fortress of Adrianople, which has been the principal bone of contention since the beginning of the war between Turkey and the Balkan allies, still remains at this moment the real stumbling block in the way of the attainment of peace. Compensation for Bulgaria, however, in some other part of European Turkey will probably, in the end, remove even this difficulty and enable her to consent to the retention by Turkey of the great fortress which the allied troops have been unable to subdue.

Salonika has been suggested as a possible bait to induce the Bulgarians to abandon their claims to the northern city which the Turks refuse to yield. Perhaps with some such idea in their minds, the Turkish delegates have, it is reported, included in the counter proposals they have offered to the peace conference the stipulation that Salonika shall remain in their hands, a line being drawn from that southern port through Serrae and Adrianople to Midia.

The maximum demands of the Balkan allies and the minimum offer of the Turks will thus be before the peace delegates when they assemble again at James' Palace on Saturday, and a definite basis for bargaining will have been formulated. If the Turks are successful in retaining Adrianople they will doubtless consent to limit their demands to a western boundary running from Adrianople southward along the railroad to Elos on the Aegean Sea, thus leaving the Dardanelles Straits in their hands.

Raise Fund Of Half A Million in Liquor Fight

Washington, Dec. 21.—Nearly 400 temperance workers from throughout the United States who have been here to urge the passage of legislation prohibiting shipments of liquor into "dry territory" have scattered for their homes to work towards the raising of a fund of \$500,000 in yearly installments of \$100,000 for the inauguration of a nationwide crusade.

TINTING LACES.

A weak solution of permanganate of potash will tint laces that deep shade of cerise so much used at present.

It must be carefully dissolved otherwise it will produce stains which are impossible to remove.

Test the dye with a small piece of muslin before dipping the lace. If the color is too deep, dilute the solution until the required hue is obtained. Never allow the lace to remain in the dye; simply dip in and out again.

Tea or a solution of coffee is excellent to tint laces. The latter produces the fashionable staining color.

Lace trimmings to match the material of the frock are much used this season.

With two or three simple colors even an amateur can produce good results.

Brighten up the kitchen with a nice coat of light-colored paint.

Cut out the parlor and make a living room of it. You will all live on longer for it.

A common ten-cent file will be a better edge to a carving knife than the most expensive steel.

To polish kitchen knives mix a little bicarbonate of soda with the pink luster and rub them thoroughly.

One ounce of coarse salt dropped in the sink will prevent the drain pipe from freezing over night.

A tablespoonful of washing soda and a cup of vinegar poured down the sink will clean out the most stubborn of clogged pipes.

To clean white and delicate plum not badly soiled, rub with a pan of equal parts of soda and water.
