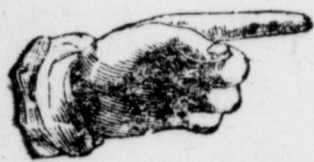

Suffragettes at Albany After 174 Miles' Hike.

Albany, N. Y., Dec. 28.—Tired and footsore, but still enthusiastic and glorying in the fact that they reached their destination two days ahead of the

schedule, the little band of suffragette pilgrims, who walked 174 miles from New York to present a message to Governor-elect Sulzer, advocating votes for women, arrived in Albany shortly after 4 o'clock this afternoon.

### Largest Underground Waterway.

The United States reclamation service recently announced that the headings had met in the great Gunnison tunnel which the government is building in western Colorado to carry the water of the Gunnison river into the Uncompahgre valley, where it will be used for irrigation. The tunnel, which will be cement lined throughout and will have a finished cross section of 10½ by 11½ feet, will be the largest underground waterway in the world. It is six miles in length and will carry 1,300 cubic feet of water per second. Its cost will be over \$2,500,000.

### Power of Gasoline.

The amount of gasoline to run an automobile a certain distance may be determined as follows: One gallon of gasoline will run a one cylinder thirty miles; two cylinder, twenty miles; four cylinder, fifteen miles; six cylinder car, ten miles.—Popular Mechanics.
