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
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DR. MARY WALKER IN

If the mixture saems a little stiff add a very little milk. Pour into buttered mold, giving plenty of room for it to swell; cover and steam one hour and a quarter. Fruit may be added if a richer pudding is desired.

GINGER DROP COOKIES.

One cupful of light brown sugar two-thirds of a cupful of butter, one-half cupful of cold water, one egg, two thirds of a cupful of molasses, one large tablespoonful of ginger, one large tablespoonful of soda, and flour to make a thick batter. Drop by spoonfuls on a well-greased pap. Bake in a moderate oven.

HOT SLAW.

Butter the size of an egg, one-half cup of sweet milk, yolks of two eggs, one teaspoonful of salt, one-quarter teaspoonful of pepper, small level teaspoonful of ground mustard, one-half cup vinegar. Put the butter into the skillet with the finely chopped cabbage and other ingredients, and stir constantly until the cabbage heats through.
