ly with the other ingredients. Bake in a deep tin for a loaf cake. A cup of nut meats makes this cake most excellent, or the nuts may be pressed in the icing.

CUTTING EXPENSES.

When eggs are scarce and high, in making doughnuts, boil and much a good-sized potate, beat it in with the sugar and muke the doughnuts as usual without any egg. They will keep moist and good.

In making pumpkin or squash pies, in place of eggs, roll crakers

fi use as much of them in bulk as you would of eggs: You could not tell the d fference, if you did not know.

When you want pudding for dianer and have no milk, try adding another egg and a few more raisins, and use warm water insted of milk.

If butter becomes strong put it in a kettle with clean water, allowing a quart of water to each pound of butter. Boil with the kettle uncovered for two hours; then set away to cool. When the butter has hardened, skim it, wash, salt and work it as in making fresh butter. This will make the most rancid butter almost like fresh.

TO REMOVE SHINE FROM SKIRT. The back of a skirt, especially a tight one, often acquires a shiny look that is not removed by ordinary pressing. It is often possible to remove the shine by rubbing it on the right side with ammonia and water, equal arts, pand then ironing on the wrong side while damp. It should be well dried ont; with the iron. If the shine is due to hard wear which has rubbed the pile off, ammonia will not improve it, and it should be gently sandpapered. Lay fabric flat on a table and pass fine sandpaper gently over it. This will bring up hhe pile but it should not be done so roughly as to wear the fabrid into holes.

Turning Polished Nuts.

Almost all machines are made with some nuts or bolt heads finished "bright" or highly polished, and to set them up tight and not mar the surfaces calls for more than an ordinary monkey wrench. A special socket head must be made to fit the head close and used with an ordinary wrench in turning a nut. Where only a few bolts or nuts are to be tightened take a strip of heavy tin or zinc and bend it to the shape of the nut to take the place of the special socket head. The jaws of the wrench should be perfectly parallel and set up as close as possible.

Machine to Test the Voice. Professor John A. Anderson of Johns Hopkins, through the agency of an invention and a series of experiments carried on in the physical laboratory of the university, declares that any musical instrument or the human voice may be tested as to the quality of tone and the fact definitely learned whether the instrument or the voice is a good one. Those who have studied the matter declare that it will revolutionize the manufacture of musical instruments and will work wonderful improvements in the musical world.

Strength of Nickel Steel.

A test of nickel steel riveted joints made from four different kinds of commercial nickel steel showed the strength of nickel steel to be about two to two and a quarter times as high as that of joints riveted with wrought iron or mild steel rivets. The advantage thus gained more than counteracts increased cost.

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
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
