**HOUSEHOLD.**

**Divinity Fudge.**

This sweetmeat was known first  
 as society, then divinity fudge.  
 Boil together two cups of fine  
 granulated sugar, half a cup of  
 water, and half a cup of corn syrup  
 until it reaches the hard ball de-  
 gree; then pour in a fine stream  
 into the beaten white of an egg,  
 add a teaspoonful of vanilla or  
 other flavoring, and a cup of brok-  
 en nut meats, or candied fruit, as  
 desired.

**Candied Oranges.**

Method Carefully peel and di-  
 vide seedless oranges into sections.  
 Make a syrup of one cup of sugar  
 and one-half of water. When it  
 has boiled clear, drop in the oran-  
 ges, let remain until clear, then  
 take out carefully, drain well, then  
 dip in bowl of granulated sugar.  
 Lay on waxed paper to dry.

**Candied Lemons**

Method-- Pare nice firm lemons  
 removing all the white skin, cut  
 into rounds, then make syrup and  
 prepare as directed for oranges.

**Southern Corn Cakes**

Mix and sift three fourth of a  
 cupful of corn meal, one and one-  
 fourth cupfuls of flour, one-fourth  
 cupful of sugar, one-half teaspoon-  
 ful of salt and five teaspoonfuls of  
 baking powder. Add one cupful of  
 milk, one egg well beaten, and one  
 and one-half tablespoonfuls of melt-  
 ed butter. Bake in a hot oven  
 twenty-five minutes.

**Substitute for Lard.**

When baking griddle cakes, in-  
 stead of greasing the griddle, rub  
 it with a small bag of salt. The  
 cakes are just as brown, and the  
 kitchen is not filled with the odor  
 of burning lard.

Spoons can be prevented from  
 falling into kettles by making V  
 shaped cuts in their handles and  
 folding the points back to form  
 hooks.

**To Keep Pickles from Molding**

A few small pieces of horse rad-  
 ish root placed in the tops of jars  
 or bottles will prevent mold form-  
 ing on pickles, such as green toma-  
 to, chow-chow, or anything of  
 that kind. Two or three slices in  
 the vinegar with your cucumber  
 pickles will answer the same pur-  
 pose. Bottled horse-radish may be  
 used if the root is not at hand.

**Alcohol on Windows.**

When washing windows in win-  
 ter use a small cloth wet in alcohol.  
 This is excellent to remove any  
 kind of dirt on windows, and can  
 be dried without difficulty, since  
 they will not become frosted as  
 when water is used.

**To Extract a Splinter.**

When a splinter has been driven  
 deep into the hand, it can be ex-  
 tracted by steam without pain.  
 Fill a wide-mouthed bottle almost  
 to the top with hot water; then,  
 place the injured part over the  
 mouth of the bottle and press  
 lightly. The suction will draw the  
 flesh down, and in a minute or two  
 the steam will extract the splinter  
 and relieve the inflammation.

After cleaning brass or copper  
 with salt and vinegar, rub with  
 olive oil, and metal will not tarn-  
 ish for a long time.

Get a nickel's worth of stick glue  
 at your druggist's, and put three  
 or four small pieces at intervals,  
 in the soil around your fern. Put this  
 in the soil two or three times a  
 year and you will see a marked  
 improvement in your ferns.

During the past forty years the Chi-  
 cago Orphans' Association has cared  
 for 4,500 children, and it has preserv-  
 ed a careful record of what it costs  
 to keep a child. From 1874 to 1883  
 the annual cost per child was \$79.98;  
 from 1884 to 1893, \$88.08; from 1894  
 to 1903, \$101.45; from 1904 to 1913,  
 \$140.00. We presume the manage-  
 ment has been fairly economical, and  
 a large institution can save in many  
 ways by buying in quantity; but if  
 it costs \$140 a year to keep a child,  
 where does the man come in who is  
 trying to raise a family of say, five  
 children on \$12 a week? And yet we  
 wonder why he can't pay his debts!

One of our newspaper confreres who  
 has kept track of the matter has the  
 following significant item in relation  
 to Montreal: "In the month of Aug-  
 ust two Montrealers were murdered,  
 thirteen were drowned, eleven were  
 killed by street cars, six were killed  
 at work, four were burned to death,  
 four met death by railway accidents  
 and one was killed by an explosion.  
 Life in Scutari during the siege, or in  
 Mexico in the days of the revolution,  
 was tame compared with this." And  
 if we had a record of the sudden  
 deaths in Toronto by violence and ac-  
 cident for one month we would have  
 a showing just about as startling.

Efficiency in labor means total ab-  
 stinence. The Crown Prince of Swed-  
 en at Hesselholm in 1910 declared.  
 "That nation which is first to free it-  
 self from the injurious effects of  
 alcohol will thereby obtain a marked  
 advantage over other nations in the  
 amicable and intensive struggle for  
 existence. I hope that our country  
 will be the one which will first un-  
 derstand and secure this advantage."

These words of the Crown Prince  
 chime with those of the German Em-  
 peror delivered at Murwick in Feb-  
 ruary, 1911, "The nation which takes  
 the smallest quantity of alcohol will  
 win the battles of the future."—Am-  
 erican Advance.

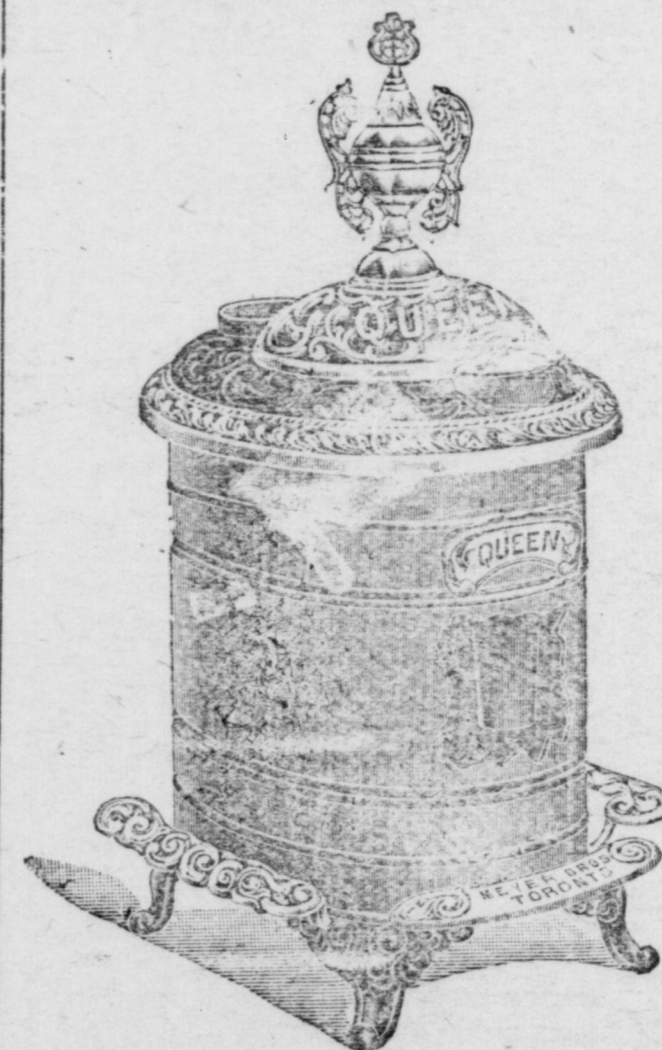
