ADVENT CONFERENCE.

The New Brunswick Advent Christian conference will hold its annual session with the Adventist church of this town. The meetings will begin Thursday evening, Jan. 1st. Services will be held all day Friday, Saturday and Sunday. The morning service each day will be held at 10 o'clock and the afternoon services will be at 2.30 and 7.30 o'clock. Evangelist Geo. W. Sederquist, of Lynn, Mass., will have charge of the principal services. All the services are open to the public.

Agricultural Society

A meeting of the Agricultural Society was held Saturday afternoon when the land committee reported that they had bought land necessary for exhibition purposes and trotting park from the Bull estate, and Charles L. Smith for \$4,500, about twenty acres in all. A construction committee was appointed and tenders will be asked for buildings—the lumber to be on the ground this winter and building operations to commence early as possible.

The second Tuesday in September next was fixed as the opening date of the first exhibition on the new grounds. The dates will not conflict with other exhibitions, but are fixed with a view of giving exhibitions and an opportunity to include Woodstock in a circuit comprising nearby New Brunswick and Aroostook towns.
