# Great Northarn Immense Project

WENATGHFE, Wash., April 5 .-Actual construction work was started tc-day on the Chaelan River powerplant, the central feature in the colos sil plans of the Great Northern Railway to electrify its lines throughout this section of the Northwest. The pro ject calls for the construction of a dam which is expected to be one of the engineering wonders of America. The cost of the entire power-plant will be close to \$10,000,000. It will develop abcut 100,000 horsepower. This will be sufficient to electrify not only the upriver branch of the Great Northern, but all of its main lines east of the Cascades to Spokane.
