A Great Device For British Ships Only.

LONDON, April 5—The London Standard says that by a jealously guarded secret invention the British navy may, it is claimed, be protected from an aerial attack. The inventor, Arthur Jenkins, an Englishman, and managing director of the Dakota, Kansas and Gulf Railway, told the standard reporter that he believes the discovery will banish the fear of air-craft dropping bombs on a warship. He has been in communication with Winston Churchill on the subject. The Admiralty experts tested the invention and he alleged were convinced of its epoch-marking qualities. Mr. Jenkins asserted he was not approached on the subject from the view point of financial gain. He was an Englishman all through, and the invention was for British ships only. The other powers are anxious to get the secret. Secret service men on behalf of the German and Russian governments approached him once, asking him to name his own price.

Great Northern Immense Project

WENATCHEE, Wash., April 5.—Actual construction work was started to-day on the Chaelan River power-plant, the central feature in the colossal plans of the Great Northern Railway to electrify its lines throughout this section of the Northwest. The project calls for the construction of a dam which is expected to be one of the engineering wonders of America. The cost of the entire power-plant will be close to \$10,000,000. It will develop about 100,000 horsepower. This will be sufficient to electrify not only the upper branch of the Great Northern, but all of its main lines east of the Cascades to Spokane.
