**A Shift of Wind Saved**  
**Biddeford, Maine**

Biddeford, Me., Aug. 21.—A shift of  
wind saved Biddeford from a serious  
disaster when it turned back a forest  
fire that had swept up to the very out-  
skirts of the city, despite the efforts of  
800 militiamen, firemen and volunteers  
summoned by a riot call. At West  
street, where the danger was greatest  
the flames were within a few yards of  
ice-plant and a number of dwelling.  
Many of the fire-fighters, hemmed in by  
the rapidly spreading fire, had narrow  
escapes. Thousands of acres of land  
were burned over, but as there was no  
valuable standing timber in the way the  
loss was comparatively small.

**Frosted Peaches.**  
Select some peaches that are not  
too ripe, and dip them one at a  
time in water that has just boiled,  
so that the skin may be easily re-  
moved. Then cook the peaches in  
a syrup until they are soft to the  
fingers. Strain them and plunge  
them into the whites of eggs beaten  
to snow, roll them in powdered  
sugar, and leave them for a few  
minutes in a gentle oven. Hash  
some macaroons and angeliques,  
and on removing the peaches from  
the oven roll them in this hash.

**Old-fashioned Almond Rings.**  
Roll one half-pound of puff-  
paste very thin, and cut out with  
biscuit-cutter. From each round  
cut a smaller one from the center  
so that the ring will be about an  
inch wide. Beat the whites of  
six eggs to a stiff froth, and one-  
half pound of pulverized sugar,  
and stir with the dish in boiling  
water until the meringue is thick.  
Slice one-half pound of blanched  
almonds very thin. Stir them into  
the meringue. Cool. Then with a  
silver knife place this mixture on  
the rings. Bake at the temperature  
proper for cake. These almond  
rings will keep fresh for several  
weeks.

**Scotch Short Bread.**  
Mix together one pound of flour  
and one-half pound of butter, stir  
in one pound of sugar, and the  
yolk of one egg. Work with the  
hands until stiff; cut in two por-  
tions. Sugar the board instead of  
flouring it, and mould the dough,  
pinching the edge like pastries  
pick with a fork to prevent it  
rising in blisters. Mark it before  
baking, and break it when serving.  
Put on a tin or in a round tin, un-  
greased, and bake a long time in a  
very slow oven. It is of a fawn  
color when done, and is soft until  
cold. It is improved by putting  
the dough into a cool place for an  
hour before baking.

**Sea-foam Fudge.**  
Put two cupfuls of light brown  
sugar and one cupful of thin cream  
into a saucepan; boil together until  
it can be moulded into a ball in  
water, but not to the brittle stage.  
Have ready one egg-white beaten  
until stiff and dry, over which  
pour the boiling syrup, beating con-  
stantly. Add any preferred flavor-  
ing and continue beating until  
stiff. Drop on buttered plates in  
teaspoonful portions, giving each  
candy a pointed look.

**Marshmallow Fudge**  
Cook together two cupfuls of  
granulated sugar, two ounces bitter  
chocolate and one-half cupful of  
sweet cream, or milk to which is  
added a teaspoonful of butter.  
When it forms a soft ball in cold  
water remove from fire, add one-  
half pound of the best marshmal-  
lows and beat briskly until it stiff-  
ens. Pour into buttered plates,  
and when cool mark into squares.

Old fruit stains can often be removed  
by oxalic acid.

London, Aug. 18.—A blue book  
was issued last night on the report of  
Alan Hay Milne, special Board of Trade  
commissioner, dealing with the probable  
effect on British trade in Central  
America of the opening of the Panama  
Canal. Mr. Milne says there is great di-  
versity of opinion on the question but  
he believes that British trade can re-  
tain its position only as the result of  
constant vigilance in view of the ten-  
dency of the American republics to be-  
come increasingly dependent commer-  
cially, on the United States.

It is the opinion of Mr. Milne, how-  
ever that the increasing political stabil-  
ity of the Central American republics  
and the consequent commercial security  
from extended American influence in  
Central American affairs, will attract  
capital to develop resources in Central  
America.

**Kegs Of Whiskey In Cement And**  
**Tar**

**SOUTH PORCUPINE, Ont., Aug. 22**  
—By the disclosure that barrels of cem-  
ent and pitch contained within them ten  
gallon kegs of whiskey, the provincial  
police of this district claimed they have  
put a stop to a great deal of the liquor  
traffic. On Monday afternoon Provincial  
Constables Smith and Jordan became  
suspicious of a barrel of tar, weighing  
nearly 300 pounds, being unclaimed at  
the station. They managed to shift the  
heavy barrel and heard a jolting noise  
inside. They immediately opened the  
barrel and on digging out the hard tar,  
located the ten gallon keg of whiskey  
inside. A five hundred pound barrel of  
cement, which had been allowed to set  
solid, was next investigated and another  
ten gallon keg fell into the hands of the  
police. This was the start of an inves-  
tigation and arrests followed.

**Germany To Extend**  
**'Most Favored Nation' Plan**

**BERLIN, Aug. 22**—Immediately the  
Reichstag reassembles a measure will  
be laid before the House affecting Ger-  
many's commercial relations with Eng-  
land and the overseas dominions. The  
bill authorizes the federal council to ex-  
tend the "most favored nation" treat-  
ment to Great Britain, her colonies  
and other possessions. This arrange-  
ment has already been in force with all  
the dominions excepting Canada, which  
in 1910 obtained concessions on twenty  
five articles in the German tariff in re-  
turn for the suspension of the 33 1-3 per  
cent. surtax, levied by the Canadian  
Government on all German goods enter-  
ing the Dominion. Several previous at-  
tempts have been made to bring Canada  
into line, but without success.
