Parsons' Pills Help The Liver

GRAND FORKS, N. D., Feb. 6.—Hundreds of thousands of tons of coal are being consumed in Western North Dakota by fires which are burning in undeveloped mines, and action will be taken by the State Legislature to halt this destruction of the State's natural resources. Evidence regarding the destruction of lignite coal by slow fires was received at a hearing yesterday to investigate the possibilities of North Dakota coal. The State Geologist reported that there are about 32,000 square miles of coal beds in the State, with an estimate tonnage of 500,000,000,000 tons.

Twenty-seven below Zero at Campbellton

The mercury touched its lowest point at the Observatory this morning before daylight, when 10 degrees below was registered. After that it rose gradually till at 8 o'clock it stood at 9 below and at noon 4 above zero. The indications are for a continuance of cold weather. The heavy frost will ensure a good thickness of ice for the ice harvesters at Lily Lake and other sheets of water near the city. Outside reports show:

Richibucto—The thermometer registered 26 below zero this morning; not enough snow for sleighing.

Cunham—Last night the thermometer dropped to 16 below; the coldest for this winter. The night before the reading showed 13 below on the government bulb.

Moncton—Eleven below.

Newcastle—Eighteen below.

Campbellton—Twenty-seven below.

S. Stephen—Fair and cold; about 14 below this morning.

A Washington despatch predicts real winter weather ahead. Between Feb. 6 and 10 a disturbance will cross the continent, it is claimed. "It will be preceded by a cold wave and accompanied by very high temperatures and all the weather features accompanying the latter storm will be greater than the average storm forces. Some precipitation with northern snows as the storm approaches, turning to rain as the warm wave comes in. It will reach Pacific coast about Feb. 8, cross the Pacific slope by close of 9, great central valleys 10 to 12, eastern sections 13. Warm wave will cross Pacific slope about Feb. 8, great central valleys 10, eastern sections 12. Cool wave will cross Pacific slope about Feb. 11, great central valleys 13, eastern sections 17. This will be a moderate storm and will not materially interfere with outdoor affairs particularly west of the Alleghenies. As it approaches the Atlantic this storm will increase in force and out on the Atlantic will be of greater than average force. In a general way February temperatures will be much lower last part of the month than the first part. From near Feb. 6 to 25 a great fall in temperature will occur. One of the most severe storm periods of the winter will be from Feb. 18 to 28.

Duke Connaught Will Not Leave

OTTAWA, Feb. 6.—The announcement that the Duke and Duchess of Connaught will return to Canada has been received with general satisfaction at Ottawa, as the impression was prevalent at the Capital that their Royal Highnesses would not return. It was felt that the state of the Duchess' health was such that her return to England would mark the end of their term. When the Duke was appointed it was understood that it would be only for two years. The belief is now that if he returns it will be for the full five years.

IS WINTER OVER?

Newport News, Feb. 4.—Wild geese flying northward, frogs croaking in ponds, fruit trees in bloom, and green fields, lead the oldest lay weather prophets to predict that winter really is over, despite the present cold snap over the Atlantic States.

Reach Bardenelles is the Allies' Plan

LONDON, Feb. 6.—The main object of the Bulgarian armies apart from the reduction of the fortress of Adrianople was disclosed in the despatches from Sofia today. They are endeavoring to reach the Dardanelles Straits and to clear them for the passage of the Greek fleet into the Sea of Marmora, whence it will be able to attack Constantinople directly from the sea.

From the reports of the fighting to the north of the peninsula of Gallipoli, it can be seen that one of the columns of King Ferdinand's troops is marching straight for the city of Gallipoli. It has occupied already the villages of Medeste, Charkui, Lavak and Bulair, which are on the neck of the peninsula. It has not yet, however, come in-

to contact with any large force of Turkish troops of which there are said to be 700,000 on the Gallipoli Peninsula. These in the opinion of military experts, should, owing to their favorable position, be able to offer a strenuous resistance to the advance of Bulgarians from the north. The guns of the Dardanelles forts also can be trained toward the land side, so that the Bulgarians have a severe task before them. Even with these preparations for battle in Gallipoli, in the bombardment of Adrianople in progress and with the movements of troops at the Tchatalja line before Constantinople. The diplomats of Europe are convinced that the war will not last long.

LONDON, Feb. 7.—The reports of even the few incidents in the Balkan war received here are viewed with considerable skepticism since it is well understood that they merely reflect the views of the respective army headquarters desire to spread. Yesterday's report from Constantinople of losses inflicted by the Turkish fleet on the Bulgarian army advancing through the neck of the peninsula of Gallipoli is to-day declared unfounded by the Bulgarian war office at Sofia.

The Bulgarian staff asserts also that the Ottoman force which attempted yesterday to advance from the Tchatalja lines in the direction of Izzidja was quickly repulsed by the Bulgarian troops and compelled to retreat behind the lines after suffering heavy losses.

The bombardment of Adrianople continues without any appreciable advantage being secured by either combatant.

Military experts here doubt whether the allies, even if they secured a firm foothold on the shores of the Sea of Marmora, possess sufficient strength in siege guns to overcome the powerful defences along the Dardanelles Straits, even on the European side, to say nothing of the still stronger forts on the Asiatic side of the channel, which alone would be able to bar the passage of the Greek fleet from the Aegean Sea to the Sea of Marmora.

In Germany it is asserted that in the event of the operations of the allies actually threatening the forts dominating the Dardanelles Straits, and which serve as the

LONDON, Feb. 7.—The Constantinople correspondent of the Times says it is believed that the Turkish fleet on Wednesday and Thursday bombarded the Bulgarian positions on the coast near Rodo. It is reported that the Bulgarians withdrew last night after burning Rodo, where the Ottoman troops effected a landing.

BUCHARST, Roumania, Feb. 7.—The Roumanian government today instructed its minister to Bulgaria to approach the Bulgarian government with a view to arranging the resumption of the negotiation between the two countries in regard to the frontier question and the settlement of Roumania's territorial claims. The Roumanian minister will also urge upon Bulgaria the necessity of bringing the matter to a speedy conclusion.

The Roumanians claim the strip of territory which will extend her coast line on the Black Sea.

Brown Tail Moth.

A crew of men engaged in the Brown Tail Moth work have returned from Woodstock where they conducted a campaign in the vicinity of that place. They report that the pest has been practically exterminated in that section of the province as a result of the extensive work which was carried on last year. Other parties are working near Fredrickton Junction, Oromocto and Harvey Station.


