Mr. Roosevelt's letter follows:

"There is not and never has been a single wild tiger in all Africa, but the leopard is found there in abundance and is often mistakenly called tiger. The lion is found in abundance in both Asia and Africa, although it is getting very rare in Asia. As late as the time of Xerxes it was still found in southeastern Europe.

"The tiger is found through much of Asia, from Manchuria down to the Malay Peninsula, thence into India, and replaces around the Caspian Sea up to the Caucasus Mountains."

### Suffragettes destroy Valuable Property.

LONDON, Feb. 8.—Militant suffragettes destroyed many valuable plants and did other damage in the hot houses of the Kew Horticultural Gardens during the early hours of this morning, when they developed another part of their plan of campaign to force the British government to give the parliamentary vote to women.

It is believed a number of women hid themselves in the gardens over night, for this morning long before the day staff came on duty it was found that a large number of rare orchids had been uprooted and scattered in all directions. Thirty panes of glass in the orchid houses had been broken and the total damage is estimated at from \$4,000 to \$5,000.

When the night watchmen had made their rounds at one o'clock in the morning everything was still and in good order, and the women must have laid their plans well beforehand, in order to find hiding places where they could hide in security. No trace of them has since been found.

The window smashing raids also continue in London. Two immense windows in an establishment in Oxford street, which has heretofore been immune, because of the proprietors' contributions to the women's funds' were broken during the night.

The postal authorities to-day issued a notice that there would be a delay on all telegrams despatched from the south to the north of England, as the result of the cutting of the telegraph wires in the provinces by the suffragettes yesterday.

### SUFFRAGETTES TORE UP THE TURF AGAIN.

LONDON, Feb.—The militant suffragettes made a concerted raid on the golf links all over the United Kingdom last night. The championship green at Sandwich and the links at Cromer, Eppingham, Chingford and other places, were ruined by being dug up and the throwing of acids about the holes.

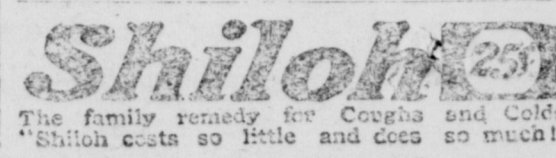
