Before June Plant Some Begonias

In making plans for the summer flower-beds, something may be need-ed that will not only grow, but bloom. in the shady beds under the trees or along the north side of the house or verandah. There is nothing so valuable for such locations as the beautifully, foliaged, bright-hued flowered, tuberous-rooted begonia.

These plants are very susceptible to the cold and cannot be planted in the open ground earlier than June 1, but can be started in boxes in the house much earlier, and will then be good-sized plants by the time they can be planted in their permanent beds.

They should have rich, sandy soil, and plenty of moisture. The flowers are red, white, pink, and yellow, in colors, and there are both single and double varieties. The fringed tuberous-rooted begchias have fringed edges, like carnations and are valued either for bedding or

The scarlet veined, bronze and green foliage makes a very attractive plan[†], even before the flowers appear, but when covered with the large branches of the waxy flowers the are as pretty and showy as any flower that can be found. The flowers are produced in great abundance through the summer and until cut down by frost.

On the approach of cold weather they will drop off, joint by joint. They solud then be dug, thoroughly dried in the sun. and stored away for the winter in a box of perfectly dry sand which should be kept dry.
