## Eddle Insects

Certain insects, resembling the northern June bugs, are found in great quantities in the high plains about Quito, and are toasted by the natives and eaten as a delicacy. They are also sold in the streets, just as peanuts or other nuts would be. A traveller tasted one and found that it was very much like toasted bread with no particular flavor. While this may seem a curious and perhaps repulsive form of food, it is really no worse than soft shell or oyster crab, which last-named is generally eaten while still alive. It is a matter of custom.
