GALGARY, Alta., May 21.—Oil and gas have been encountered in commercial quantities in wells which are being drilled in the Black Diamond district, thirty-five miles from Calgary. The strike is responsive for a rush on the land offices, and during the past few days oil and gas claims have been filed in nine townships.

## Co-Operation And Fruit Growing

Those who are familiar with the history of apple growing in Canada are aware that single handed it has been very difficult, yes almost impossible, to succeed in orcharding beyond a few trees, and that only since co-operation became a strong factor in the enterprise has the industry become established on a permanent and prosperous basis. During the last decade of the past century it was no uncommon thing in parts of Ontario to see splendid orchards chopped down for firewood. Growers could get little more for their fruit than the actual expenses incurred in producing it and so the industry had little to justify its continuance. It was under these circumstances that as a last resort the co-operative movement in the industry began. That it has succeeded and with it the commercializing of the apple industry on a large scale there can be no manner of doubt, as already there have been organized throughout Canada no less than 106 co-operative societies and the number is constantly increasing.

To outline in more or less detail the principles of co-operation, the more desirable methods to adopt in putting these principles into practice and the objects to be gained in apple growing by their adoption there has been issued from Ottawa a comprehensive bulletin entitled "Co-operation and Fruit growing". It has been prepared by Mr. Alex. McNeil, Chief of the Fruit Division who is recognized as one of the foremost authorities of the day on the subject of fruit culture, commerce and co-operation.

In this work of 43 pages the subject is treated from practically every standpoint that interests the Canadian apple grower. Not only are the essentials and methods of co-operation clearly brought out but the advantages being derived through its agency are clearly shown. The aims of co-operation as applied to the fruit industry are enumerated as follows:—

- To bring fruit products as directly as possible from the producer to the consumer.
- To encourage the best methods of production.
- To encourage thrift in the fruit grower, and economy, intelligence, enterprise and honesty in the packing, grading and marketing of fruit.
- To make it possible for a number of small growers to establish a commercial standing that will be a guarantee for grade marks or contracts.
- To act as a credit organization to make advances on products in the process of being sold.

Dealing with the labor problem which confronts every kind of farming it is shown that Nova Scotia growers through their central association in 1911 were able to take care of a crop twice the usual size.

Besides the other great advantages of sure markets and good price secured for fruit the bulletin cites the savings that are effected in buying supplies. There is given a list of the purchases of one society in which the manager claims to have made a saving of \$15,000 in one year on goods which cost in the aggregate \$75,000 and included packages, spraying equipment and materials, fertilizers, drain tiles, etc.

The work is issued as bulletin No. 38 of the Dairy and Cold Storage Commissioner's series and is for general distribution by the Publications Branch of the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa.

## Woman Suffragists Will Go After Baseball Fans.

PHILADELPHIA, May, 19.—The woman suffragists will begin at once here a campaign to convert the baseball "fans" to their cause. Permission has just been given some of the suffrage workers to invade the parks of both the American and National League. The campaign will start with the distribution of a leaflet headed "Woman's Suffrage and Baseball."

The \$10,000 reward offered by the State two years ago for apprehension of the persons responsible for the dynamiting of the Times building in Los Angeles is about to be paid. A bill appropriating that amount to satisfy the claim of William Burns was passed on Saturday in the assembly by a vote of 52 to 14 and sent to the governor, having already passed the Senate. San Francisco members all voted against the bill.

A six-foot clock which stands in an office at Carlisle, Pa., has been operated by electricity from the earth since 1870. A wire runs from the earth to a magnet in the clock and so constant has the supply of electricity been that the clock has run well-nigh continuously since it was invented.

## Great Activity Shown In Philadelphia Navy Yard.

PHILADELPHIA, May 19.—All of the great battleships of the Atlantic reserve fleet stationed at the Philadelphia navy yard, are being stripped and prepared for instant action. For the first time since the Spanish war all the big ships are being put in fighting trim, and this very quietly and with much secrecy. Officials of the navy yard deny that they are taking any unusual action in preparing the fleet for sea, but private investigation proves to the contrary.

Most significant is the fact that several of the old vessels, including the old cruiser Minneapan, which have not been in service for years, are being overhauled, repaired and outfitted for sea going. The Ohio is being repainted and the Alabama is also being overhauled.

Commandant Quat who has been appointed commander of the new battleship Texas, now under construction at Newport News, absolutely refused to discuss the activities at the yard. He said: "We are always preparing for war." Sea stores and ammunition are being loaded at night.

## REPORTED THAT MEXICO IS NEARING ANARCHY.

GALVESTON, Texas, May 19.—Nearly two score refugees from Mexico, who have just arrived aboard the steamer Nordica, report conditions in the Southern republic acute in some instances bordering on a state of anarchy.

Rhubarb and Strawberries.

In combining these fruits, use the same proportion as given for pineapple and rhubarb, but cook the fruits and sugar together, boiling until thick. If exceedingly rich preserves be desired equal parts of fruit and sugar may be used.

Rhubarb Marmalade.

Remove seeds and white skin from six oranges; then chop the orange pulp and rinds very fine. Cut 1 qt. of rhubarb into small pieces and add 1-2 lbs. sugar. Mix all together and boil until the mixture thickens; then seal while hot.

## Convicted Of Sending Threatening Letters.

NEWARK, N. J. May 21.—Seeley Davenport and Jacob Dunn, mountain wood choppers of Wharton, N. J. were convicted by a Federal jury on Tuesday night of sending threatening letters to Woodrow Wilson while he was President-elect. In the case of Davenport the jury commended mercy. The communications mailed to Mr. Wilson were received by his secretary, Joseph P. Tumulty, in May and December of last year, and demanded money in sums of \$1,000 and \$5,000 under a penalty of death.

## FRENCH BANKERS MAKE A BIG LOAN TO MEXICO.

MEXICO CITY, May 21.—A contract with a group of French bankers for a loan of 150,000,000 peses has been signed, according to a member of the cabinet. The conditions of the loan are not announced.

## RATE GONE UP ON RISK OF OUL-BREAK OF WAR.

LONDON, May 21.—The underwriters quote five guineas per cent, to cover the risk of an outbreak of war between the United States and Japan for three months. Eight guineas per cent was quoted to cover a similar risk for six months.

## A SUBMERGED ISLAND HAS BEEN IDENTIFIED.

ATHENS, Greece, May 21.—A submerged island, recently discovered in the sea bed under Lemnos in the Greek Archipelago, has been identified by the government archaeologist as the Islet of Chryssis, which was submerged at the beginning of the second century before the Christian era.

## THE MAMMOTH CONGRESS TO BE HELD AT TORONTO.

TORONTO, Ont., May 22.—The men in charge of the reception of the delegates to the mammoth congress to be held by the Presbyterian Church of Canada are beginning to realize the immensity of their task. Four thousand one hundred and ninety-two delegates are registered.

## Sir. Robt. Perks Fears Great Revolt In U. S.

NEW YORK, May 21. Sir Robert Perks, Bart., who has been stopping at the St. Regis for some time, sailed this morning on the Mauretania for England. "The idea of liberty in this country is a farce," said Sir Robert last night. New York is leaning, and leaning hard towards paganism. Where will it end? It is hard to say, but I fear that unless your people return to the elementary forms of Christianity there will be an age of decadence in your country followed by a revolt which will overthrow the whole social system."

## Servia Joins Greece Against Bulgaria.

PARIS, May 20 Servia and Greece have entered into a territorial alliance against Bulgaria, it is stated in a telegram from Athens published in the Excelsior to-day. This telegram stated that the two countries had entered an agreement respecting the boundaries of the Turkish territory to be acquired by both, and have bound each other to support the agreement with arms if Bulgaria objects.

## WONDERFUL PUMPS

Seven Million Gallons an Hour Lifted by Gas Explosions

The most wonderful feature of the waterworks in the East End, London, are the marvellous pumps, which, by means of a series of gas explosions, blow seven million gallons of water every hour from the River Lea into huge tubes, through which it rushes to the reservoir. The invention was conceived by the engineer, Mr. H. A. Humphrey. The following details of the works, which were five years under construction, show the imposing dimensions of the undertaking:—  
Area of reservoir: 460 acres.  
Capacity: 3,000,000,000 gallons.  
Circumference: About four and a half miles.  
Maximum depth: 40 feet.  
Cost: Over \$25,000,000.  
Pumping capacity: 7,500,000 gallons an hour.  
Persons who will be supplied with water: 1,600,000.

## UMBRELLA SUPPORT

Buckles Around Breast and Holds Umbrella Without Hands

Primarily designed for letter-carriers, the umbrella support patented by a Maryland man is likely to make other friends when it becomes well known. This support buckles around the chest, just under the armpits, and

on a plate in the centre, in front, are two grips that form a groove to engage the shank of the umbrella, which should have a hook in it if it is not a curved handle in the first place, catches under a strap that is worn around the waist. In this way the rain protector is held quite as firmly as by hand and leaves the hands free for other duties.

A new French three-handed watch tells both 12 hour and 24 hour time, one hour hand being used for each kind on separate dials while a single minute hand does for both.
