HOUSEHOLD.

PLUM AND APPLE JELLY.

Plum and apples may be used to-
gether for jelly. Cook plums and
apples separately. Use one cup of
plum juice to two cups of apple juice
and one cup of sugar for each cup of
juice used. Boil twenty-five minutes.
Put into jelly tumblers and allow to
cool and cover with paraffine.

A chicken never should be eaten
the day it is killed. The tenderest
fresh-killed chicken will be tough
immediately after the animal heat
has left the body. In about twelve
hours, however, the muscles will
relax, and it then becomes ac-
ceptable for food.

Ginger Pear Loaf.—Pare,
quarter and core enough pears to
make a pint of pulp when cored.
Sew the pears in a sirup, seasoned
with lemon rind, until soft enough
to mash it to a pulp; and then add
a cupful of finely chopped preserved
ginger. Soften a third of a box
of gelatin in half a cupful of water.
Bring the pulp to a boil and add
half a cupful of sugar and the gel-
atin, stirring until dissolved; then
pour into a bowl and set on ice.
When the pulp begins to stiffen
beat with a cream whip until light
and stiff; then add a pint of whipp-
ed cream that has been sweetened
pour into dish and set on ice again.
Garnish with preserved ginger

To Make Cheese At
Home.

Home-made cheese is not as difficult
to make as most people suppose. Any-
one having enough cows to obtain six
gallons of morning milk can easily
make a small cheese every day if de-
sired, says Successful Farming. It
requires no more care or labor than
numerous other jobs a farmer's wife
has to do.

The utensils needed are such as are
found in most any house. Take six
gallons of morning's milk, set on the
stove in a clean wash boiler and heat
to 85 degrees; remove from the stove
and add one-half of a rennet tablet,
also a very little cheese coloring of
the same firm, both being first dis-
solved in a little warm water; stir well
and cover with a heavy comfort; let it
stand for 40 or 50 minutes until it be-
comes thick, clabbered milk.

Then with a long sharp knife cut
this curd both ways. Let it stand a
while longer, well covered; now dip
off the whey, all that is possible. Next
take a skimmer and stir and chop the
curd, getting it well up from the bot-
tom. Chop it until it is as fine as
grains of wheat. Place a basket in a
tub, put a cheesecloth in the basket,
and into this dip the curd and let
drain, salt to taste, work gently to
mix the salt. Let it stand a while
longer, and occasionally stir around to
prevent forming a solid mass. For a
press I use a small lard press, but in
case you have no lard press a bucket
with the bottom out and a lever hinged
to a well and a weight hung on
the end, or merely weights placed on
top of the bucket will answer just as
well as a costly press.

Place a clean, wet cheesecloth in
hoop; put in your mixed curd; fold
the cloth smoothly over the top; put
on a round board that will fit the
hoop; place on your weights or what-
ever the press may be, and press light-
ly at first, afterwards more. It should
be ready for the press before noon,
and left undisturbed until evening.
Take out, trim off uneven edges, turn
other side up, pack into the press, all
weights on, and leave until morning.
Do not bandage, but put in a warm
airy room and turn and rub with fresh
butter every day. It will do to use in
four weeks.

Girl Gets New Nose
By Grafting.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 5
Surgeons at the Washington Asy-
lum Hospital are supplying a new
nose for Miss Nellie Radigan, 25
years old, by grafting two fingers
on her face. The operation has
just been completed and, they say,
gives every indication of being a
success.

Miss Radigan's nose was eaten
almost away by a cancerous disease
when she applied at the hospital
for treatment. The surgeons were
puzzled at first, but soon hit upon
a scheme for the operation. They took
her two little fingers, cut out the
bones and nails, and then, after
cutting out the cancerous tissue of
the nose, fastened the fingers to
her face. Over this was placed a
plaster cast.

This cast also holds the arm
steady and will remain on the
girl until the fingers have been
completely grafted to her face.
The process will take weeks. When
the grafting is complete the cast
will be removed and the fingers
severed from the hand.

Seventy-five members of the
Georgetown University Medical
School class witnessed the opera-
tion.
