Legal Status of the Snail in France.
 The French minister of agriculture, after a careful examination of the subject, has established "the legal status of the snail" by issuing a circular in which snails are defined as animals injurious to vegetation and therefore legally subject to capture and destruction at all times and seasons. This decision has created excitement and dismay among the numerous persons who earn a livelihood by collecting snails for market. Snails are in high favor with French epicures, and immense numbers of these mollusks are eaten in Paris. In the winter of 1900 the consumption of snails in the French capital amounted to 800 tons. The consumption has since diminished, but more than 80,000,000 snails are still received annually by the Halles Centrales, the great market of Paris.
