Legal Status of the Snail in France. The French minister of agriculture, after a eareful examination of the subject, has established "the legal status of the snail" by issuing a circular in which snalls are defined as animals injurious to vegetation and therefore legally imbject to capture and destruc-tion at all times and seasons. This demay among the numerous persons who earn a livelihood by collecting snails for market. Snails are in high favor with French opicures, and immense numbers of these mollusks are eaten in Paris. In the winter of 1900 the consumption of snaffs in the French capital amounted to 800 tons. The eonsumption has since diminished, but more than 80,000,000 snails are still received annually by the Halles Centrales, the great market of Paris.
