COOKIES.

Stuffed cookies are a delectable novelty. The ingredients for the cookies are one cup of white sugar one-half cup of butter, one egg, one-half cup of milk, one teaspoon vanilla and three and one-half cups of flour with which two teaspoons of baking powder have been sifted. Make a filling of one-half cup white sugar, one-half cup water, one cup of chopped raisin, the juice of one lemon and one teaspoon flour. Cook this until it becomes thick --and it will bear much watching during the process. Roll the cookie dough very thin, as usual, and cut into small rounds; place these in pans, place a teaspoonful of the filling in the centre of each and place another cookie gently on top. Bake in a moderately hot oven.

Toughness of angel cake is often due to the fact that the eggs are not beaten properly. They should be beaten so stiff that they will "stand alone."

If almonds after being blanched are plunged into cold water they will keep snow white. To blanch them it is best to put them into cold water and let it come just to the boiling point.

TEMPTING SOUPS.
Potato Soup---Take four large potatoes, boil until done and mash smooth, adding butter and salt to taste. Heat three pints of milk in a double boiler cook the onion in it a few minutes, and then remove. Pour the milk slowly on the potato, strain, heat and serve immediately. Thicken with one table-spoonful of flour.
Baked Bean Soup---Left-over beans make a very palatable soup. Press the beans through a sieve. To a pint of the pressed material add one quart of hot milk. Slightly brown a medium sized onion, sliced; add to the soup and cook about ten minutes.
Macedoine Soup---This soup can be speedily prepared. Take any left-over vegetables that you may have on hand. If there are no potatoes boil two. Fry one onion brown and chop it fine. Place all these vegetable in a saucepan and add one pint of water. When it has reached the boiling point, add one pint of hot milk, season and serve with toast.

Cabbage Soup---Left-over cabbage can be utilized as soup. Fry it brown in butter and cook together with a tomato in a quart of boiling water for about ten minutes. Press through a sieve. Thicken with flour and butter, as directed in above receipts, and cook ten minutes longer. Then add a cupful of hot milk. If there are any left-over cooked tomatoes, on hand, half a cupful of these can be used instead of the one as above.

Corn Soup---This soup can be speedily made and requires no milk. To half a can of corn take one quart of boiling water, one teaspoonful of grated onion, and a stalk of celery. Cook ten minutes strain and season with butter, salt and pepper.

COOKING NOTES.
Extra deep pudding pans, pie plates and the like are preferable to shallow ones.

Raisins and figs should be plumped by dipping for an instant in boiling water before serving.

To boil finnan haddie soak it for a little while before putting it over the coals, and put plenty of butter on it afterwards.

Apples baked with very different seasonings--cinnamon, cloves, maple sugar, lemon or orange, make a delicious change.

When making pastry that is to be served cold, milk should be used for mixing as the pastry will keep crisp longer than if mixed with water.

Grease sweet potatoes before they are put into the oven to bake; they will bake in half the time and the skins will be soft.

A FAMOUS TOREADOR.

Bombita is Back Again Among His Adorers in Madrid.

Bombita, the darling of Spain, has recovered from the dangerous wound he had received in a bull fight, and a recent Sunday all Madrid went to the Plaza de Toros to welcome the greatest of all toreadors to the scene of former triumphs.

The sun was beating down on the tier of seats opposite me, where a thousand fluttering fans looked like brilliant butterflies. King Alfonso and the Queen were in the royal box, surrounded by the flower of the Spanish aristocracy. All the women wore the graceful mantilla and the queen had red roses in her hair.

Charmed as the people were to see the youthful king and queen, their chief thoughts were for Bombita, the dashing Bombita, whose photograph appears in dozen of newspapers every week. He is as daring and as expert a toreador as the men of the old school, but he is not in ordinary life the toreador with a little pigtail, happier in the café than in the drawing room. The fabulous fees he receives for his dangerous work permit of his keeping a motor car, and enable him to dine in the most fashionable restaurants. He is faultlessly dressed by a London tailor, and when I met him the other night at an evening party I took him to be a diplomat or a Spanish grandee.

In the arena Bombita was radiant in rose-color silk and gold lace, and he wore white silk stockings and dainty shoes--a charming costume for a masquerade, but inappropriate for the work of slaying ferocious bulls. But Bombita was superb. He played with death, like a child with a toy. He waited for a moment in the sand as his second bull, snorting with fury, rushed upon him. The creature's horns seemed within an inch of his body when he rose, stepped aside with the grace of Nijinsky, and plunged his short sword into the animal's neck.

The dexterity, the amazing daring of the man filled the critical audience with new wonder at the prowess of their favorite. A great shout went up: "The ear! The ear!" The toreador who has pleased the public by his skill is accorded the right to keep the ear of the bull he has killed as a trophy. It is for the spectators to judge whether he deserves the supreme reward. On Sunday some were opposed to the award, and for at least two minutes it hung in the balance whether Bombita would take home the trophy, and, as I suppose he does, nail it to the wall of his dining room. King Alfonso decided the matter by joining in the popular cry and Bombita received his reward.
