Turks Trapped By The Bulgarians

LONDON, March 29.—The Times says there is reason to believe that with slight modification of the frontier suggested by the powers, made necessary by railway and strategical considerations, the Bulgarians will accept the terms of peace recommended by the powers. Though the allies desire an indemnity and the powers have refused to agree to indemnity being paid by Turkey, this difference is likely to be bridged by a concession re-

garding the proportion of the Ottoman debt the allies are to assume.

The correspondent at Constantinople of the Times, says the minimum estimate of the Turkish loss at Tchatalja from Monday to Wednesday is 5,000.

CONSTANTINOPLE, March 29.—A German military aviator named Scheerf, accompanied by a Turkish officer, today flew over the Bulgarian lines before Tchatalja in a biplane. The officer reported that the Bulgarians were concentrating in strong force to the west of Biyuk Chekmedyl on the Sea of Marmora. The flying man maintained a comparatively low

level throughout his flight and although frequently under fire, the biplane was not struck by any shot.

BELGRADE, Servia, March 29.—Seventeen thousand Ottoman troops also surrendered to the Servians and the quantity of war material captured by them in the taking of the city was enormous. The Bulgarian headquarters staff has been informed that Servian co-operation with the Bulgarian troops is no longer necessary in the opinion of Servia, and the withdrawal of the Servian forces from the vicinity of Adrianople will begin today.

SOFIA, March 29.—Shukri P.

the captured Turkish commander-in-chief of Adrianople, with his staff and seven other Turkish general, arrived here today. They were received with fitting honors. They will reside here during their captivity.

LONDON, March 29.—Bulgaria has accepted the offer of mediation made by the European powers, but with provisos that practically negative the proposals of the powers.

By appearing to retreat in disorder the Bulgarians operating in the vicinity of BUK Chekmedyl, on the southern end of Tchatalja, induced a force of Turks under Ezer Bay to pursue them, says the correspondent at Constantinople of the Daily Mail this morning. The ground had been carefully mined and as the Turks advanced the mines were exploded, causing a heavy loss.

During the Bulgarian attack on the Turkish centre, last Monday, the Turks lost 1,700 men.

SOFIA, March 29.—The spoils that fell into the hands of the captors of Adrianople, include 5,400 rifles and 600 cannons. The men captured aggregate 52,220. Among them are 1,220 officers, of whom 64 are Germans, 18 Roumanians and 6 Belgians.

BELGRADE, March 29.—The Servian troops suffered great loss in their attack on Adrianople. The third and fourth battalions of the thirteen column of infantry lost 1,000 men killed and from 3,000 to 4,000 wounded, including one hundred officers. With the second column of the Bulgarian infantry the thirteenth column of Servians received orders the night of March 24-25 to attack Fort Jouttepelar. The Turks met the advancing infantry with a terrific fire. The Bulgarians were obliged to withdraw, but notwithstanding this check, the third and fourth battalions of the thirteenth Servian column were ordered to take a position near the fort at all costs. Not only did they do this, but they captured the fort itself.

LONDON, March 29.—The value of the war material captured at Adrianople is estimated at \$35,000,000, according to the Daily Telegraph's correspondent at Belgrade. The correspondent adds that it

will be divided equally between the Bulgarians and the Servians, according to an understanding reached between them.

LONDON, March 29.—The Bulgarian troops pierced the Tchatalja lines in the neighborhood of Lake Derkos on the Black Sea today and are pushing forward victoriously on Constantinople, according to a Central News despatch from Sofia.

BELGRADE, Servia, March 29.—The honor of capturing Shukri Pasha, the Turkish commander-in-chief of Adrianople, with his headquarters staff, belongs to the 20th Servian regiment of infantry.

An official statement issued here today said that Shukri Pasha, two other Turkish generals, twenty-two field officers and one hundred and fifty junior officers were in Handurluk fort to the northwest of the city when the Servian regiment stormed and captured it. On the following day Shukri Pasha was handed over by the Servians to General Nikola Ivanoff, the Bulgarian commander-in-chief.

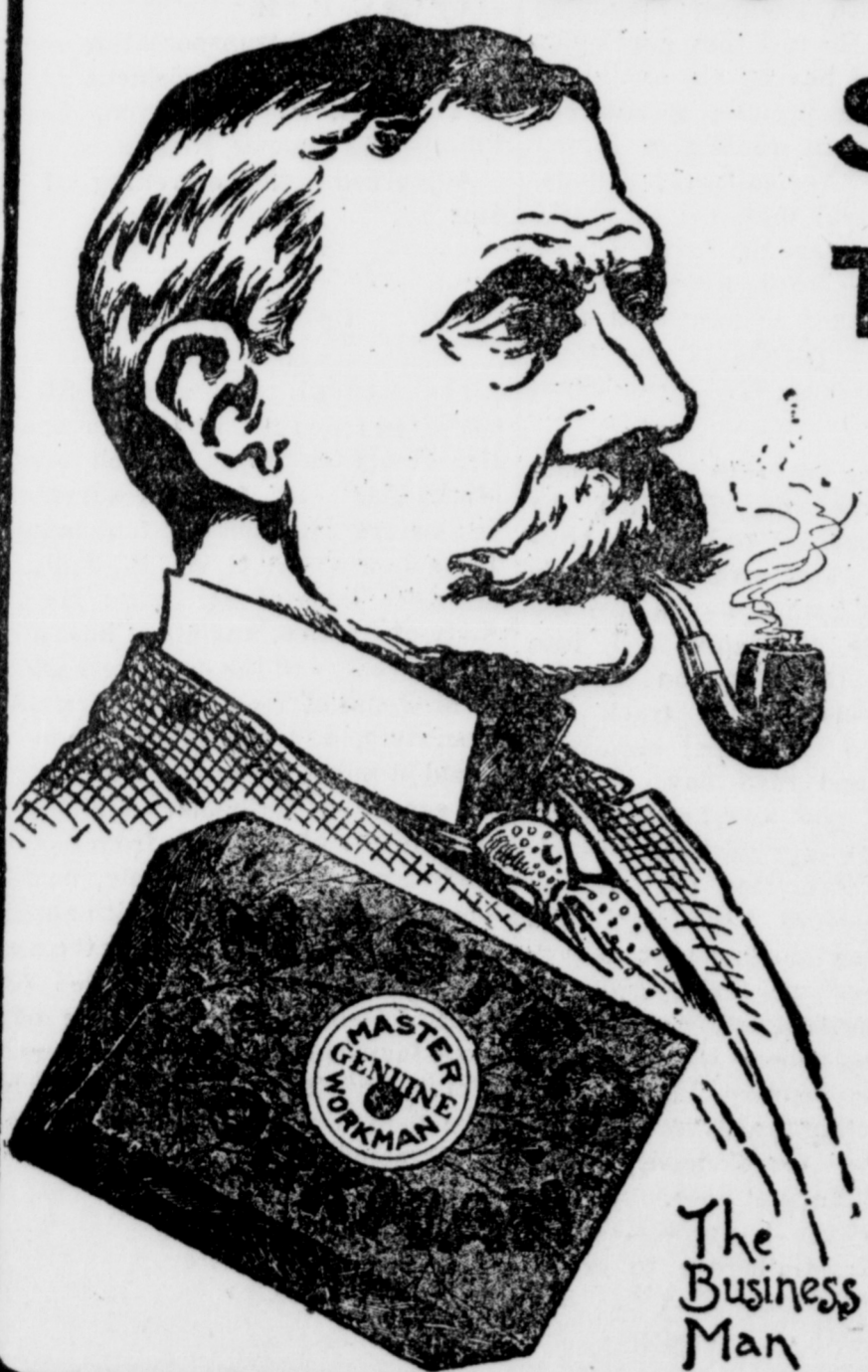
