PUFFER, ALBERTA

(From the Maritime Baptist.)

Perhaps a few items concerning our works in the far West may be interesting to the readers of your paper. Puffer is a great farming district, about 180 miles East of Calgary. It is a brush country and well adapted to mixed farming. The nearest railway station is twenty-two miles distant, but branch lines are being constructed which will bring a market within easy reach of these farmers. I came to this neighbourhood as a Baptist Missionary two months ago, and found quite a number of Baptist families from N. B. some of them having been members of the Lower Brighton church. This field like most of the prairie, has been supplied only in the summer months by various students from the different denominational colleges, but as this was far from being adequate to the need, our friends applied to headquarters for a permanent supply. The work on the whole has been encouraging. It is not easy here for people to get to services in the winter. Sometimes the thermometer registers forty or more degrees below zero, and besides the people are not yet supplied with conveniences. But "where there's a will there's a way," and the zealous souls are usually found there. The meetings are held in public school buildings. Recently we arranged a social gathering in the Fairfield District.

The meeting was well attended and evidently much enjoyed. There is very little social life on the prairie, and many young people seek for it in the dance. It is our desire to provide them with better fare, and we hope that our social helped in some manner to counteract the dancing craze.

5,000 Barrels Of Whiskey lost in Kentucky Flood

Louisville, Ky., April 2—A large warehouse of the Rugby Distillery Co. in the western end of the city, owing to flood waters, collapsed late last night, releasing to the river about 5,000 barrels of

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
