## Household

**Cherry Butter.**  
Select fresh, ripe fruit. Wash,  
stone and put them through the  
food chopper. Allow equal parts  
of sugar and cherries and allow  
one-half cup of water to each  
pound of fruit. Mix well together  
place over the fire and boil for  
twenty minutes, stirring constant-  
ly. This should make a thick, rich  
butter which will be delicious.

**Strawberry Ice.**  
Wash and hull 1 quart of berries and  
sprinkle them with one cup of sugar.  
Cover and set them aside for two hours.  
Crush the berries and press them through  
a double fold of cheesecloth. Add 1  
cup of water and the desired quantity of  
lemon juice to this berry juice, pour in,  
to a freezer and freeze.

**Strawberry Pudding.**  
Mix 2 tablespoons of butter in a sauce-  
pan and add to it 2 heaping tablespo-  
ons of corn-starch and 3 large tablespo-  
ons of sugar. Mix all together.  
Heat 1 pint of sweet milk and pour it  
into the mixture. Boil, stirring all the  
time until it thickens. Remove from  
fire, cool and add the well-beaten yolks  
of 3 eggs. Beat the whites until dry  
and stiff and fold them carefully into  
the mixture. Add the flavoring desired.  
Hull wash drain and add 2 beaten eggs  
and half fill a pudding dish with  
them. Pour the custard mixture over  
then and bake in a slow oven. Serve as  
soon as baked.

**Strawberry Sago.**  
Wash 1-2 pint of sago through se-  
veral waters, cover with a pint and a  
half of cold water and soak for two  
hours. Cook in a double boiler until  
transparent. Prepare the strawberries  
and put them into a serving dish. When  
the tapioca is cool, not cold, pour it over  
the berries and stand aside to get per-  
fectly cold. Serve with sugar alone or  
with sweetened whipped cream.

**Cherry Bread Pudding.**  
Butter the slices of bread and place  
them in a pudding dish in layers with  
the stewed cherries between. Let this  
stand for half an hour and then serve  
with a plain custard sauce.

**Strawberry Batter Cups.**  
Slightly mash 1 quart of strawberries  
and stir 1 pint of sugar into them.  
Make the batter with a cup and one-  
half of flour into which has been sifted  
1-2 teaspoon of salt and 1 teaspoon of  
baking powder. Rub into this 1 tea-  
spoon of butter and add 2 beaten eggs  
and one cup of milk. Place alternate  
layers of the batter and the berries in  
battered cups until two-thirds full;  
then steam for forty minutes. Serve  
with whipped cream.

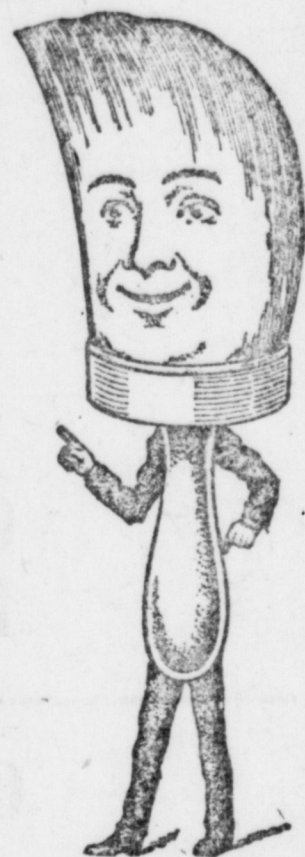
