Track-Laying Crews Want More Wages.

Fredericton, July 8.—Upwards of one hundred men, mostly foreigners, employed on track laying crews by Messrs. James A. Corbett & Sons Company, Inc. on the St. John Valley railway east of this city, went on strike this morning for higher wages. They have been receiving \$1.80 per day and it is said they asked for \$2.00, which was refused, after which they struck. The whole crew of men besieged the contractors' offices all morning endeavoring to get paid off, but were told they would have to wait for the regular pay day. Inquiries at the contractors' offices at noon brought forth the reply that the men had had some trouble with an employment agency and that was the cause for their quitting work.

UNION THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE IN MONTREAL

MONTREAL, July 4.—While expressing hearty sympathy with the movement for a union theological college in Montreal, McGill University has declined to officially recognize the institution, has declined to have the theological college become part of the university, and will not confer its degrees upon the ministerial graduates.

PRICKLY HEAT.

Prickly heat is an acute inflammation of the skin caused directly by excessive heat, and by the resulting disturbance of the function of perspiration. The skin is red, and dotted over with scarlet pimples and with little blisters the size of a pin-head, and it itches, and prickles distressingly. The eruption usually appears in very hot and especially in humid weather; and violent exercise, the eating of highly seasoned food, or the taking of hot soup or tea may bring it on. Irritation of the skin by the underclothing, especially if it be of wool, may also precipitate an attack.

If the eruption is properly treated, it usually disappears in a few days, but it is likely to recur whenever the weather becomes "muggy". The sufferer from prickly heat should wear light underclothing, preferably of linen, silk or cotton, and change it frequently; his bed-

clothing should be light; he should eat sparingly, and avoid food or drink that is highly spiced or hot; it is well to take moderate exercise early in the morning or in the evening, and to drink plenty of cold water, which may be mixed with lemon juice or some other acid, but not with alcohol in any form. A small daily dose of salts taken in the morning is useful. Two to four tablespoonfuls of borax and baking-soda added to the bath helps to prevent the eruption, or to relieve it when it is present. The itching is lessened by profusely dusting the skin with powders of zinc oxide and chalk, or by bathing it with extract of witch-hazel, or with a wash that contains zinc oxide and calamin suspended in glycerine and rose-water.

GRIST AND SAW MILL BURNED AT RICHIBUCTO

Richibucto, N. B., July 8.—The grist mill and saw mill belonging to Mr. Joseph Warren, South Branch, Kent Co., were totally destroyed by fire to-day. The fire is still raging and other buildings are in danger. The grist mill is a new roller mill put in a few years ago.

To Safeguard The Rights Of Free Speech.

Montreal, July 9.—Because some of the members of the Montreal police force did not arrest the hoodlums that knocked him unconscious while addressing a temperance meeting on Fletcher's Field, on Monday night, John H. Roberts, Secretary of the Dominion Alliance, to-day entered an appeal to the Attorney-General of the Province, asking that the present Montreal police administration be abolished. His demand is backed up by a resolution passed by the Provincial Executive of the International Order of Good Templars, which declares that the present chief of police should be replaced by an official who will safeguard the rights of free speech.

In tearing down a house on Jacobstrasse, Berlin, some laborers found a decoration of the coveted Order of the Red Eagle, advertised the fact in the newspapers and King Charles of Roumania claimed it. When he was a student in Berlin, fifty years ago the order was awarded to him by King William of Prussia but he mislaid it that very evening. All these years it lay wedged between the wall and the bath. King Charles says he will wear the decoration on his visit to Berlin in September to attend the marriage of his niece, Princess Augustine Victoria of Hohenzollern, to ex-King Manuel.

WIRELESS STATION AT NEWCASTLE, N. B.

NEWCASTLE, N. B. July 10.—The final arrangements have been made for the location of the wireless station here. Options on the properties of James Falconer, Edward Hickey, Edward Wentworth and A. J. Morrison have been closed and deeds transferred. The Universal Radio Syndicate, Ltd., head offices, London, Eng., is the concern undertaking the work. They have purchased patents and control Pavalson wireless telegraph system; conducted along similar lines as the Marconi Company; yet it is impossible for the Marconi instrument to pick up their messages and vice versa. This will be the company's main station on the Atlantic.

The property selected here will contain a square block of fifty-four acres intact, and there are no obstructions between here and the ocean to retard the sending and receiving of messages. From here messages will be forwarded to their destination by the Great North Western Telegraph Co. The wireless company at present has a wire from Montreal to Vancouver.

The contract for the concrete foundation, which will extend over several acres, will probably be awarded next week. There will be one large steel tower, five hundred feet high, which is being built in England, and will be forwarded here and put up in sections. There will also be several wooden towers, about one hundred feet high, which will be constructed on the property in close proximity to the main tower.

This station will be capable of transmitting about eighty words a minute and will give employment to forty-five or fifty hands. It is expected to have the towers completed this fall.

Mr. W. E. Fish, civil engineer, was engaged by this company some four or five months ago with a view to locate their station at some point between Moncton and Campbellton, and, after going over the several locations which looked favorable, with the company's chief engineer, Sir Dr. Erskine Murray it was seen that Newcastle had all the necessary requirements.

Terrific Storm Throughout Italy.

ROME, July 11.—A terrific storm is raging throughout Italy and in many places the country has been devastated and the crops destroyed. It is accompanied by remarkably cold weather for this time of year, the temperature in Rome at noon to day falling below 60 degrees Fahrenheit. Such weather in the middle of July has not been recorded in Italy since the year 1813, when superstitious people attributed to the repetition of the number 13.

MESSINA, July 11.—A violent tempest in the vicinity of the Straits of Messina, accompanied by a heavy fall of rain, has caused enormous damage in this region. Crops have been destroyed and floods have compelled the population to leave the huts in which they have been living since the great earthquake a few years ago.

NAPLES, Italy July 11.—Extraordinary falls of rain and hail have flooded the country for the past two days. Torrents of water mixed with mud and ashes from Vesuvius have inundated the villages along the Gulf of Turin. Owing to a strong cold wind from the north accompanied by hurricanes, the temperature fell to day almost to freezing

point. Snow is reported to have fallen in the Alps.

COSENZA, Italy, July 11.—Hurricanes, accompanied by slight shocks of earthquake and underground rumblings, have terrorized the peasants in this region for the past two days. This is more especially the case in the isolated villages where the people are still suffering from the fright caused by the earthquake which occurred at the end of June.

LAVISH IN WEALTH DISPLAY.

St. Petersburg, July 9.—Society has been surprised here by a remarkable novelty in invitations issued here for the golden wedding celebration of M. Spiridino, a very wealthy man of Moscow. All of the hundred invitations are on cards of pure gold, each weighing three quarters of an ounce, and the words are wrought in enamel.

Strawberries Preserved in Cranberry-juice.

A writer in the Designer says, if strawberries are canned or preserved in a sirup made with cranberry-juice instead of water, they retain much of their natural flavor, and the product has the color of fresh strawberries.

TO ECONIMIZE ON LETTER PAPER FOR CONGRESS.

WASHINGTON, July 9.—Jeffersonian simplicity is to be introduced into Congress at the coming session and the embossed letter paper and envelopes of the members are to be taken away. Hereafter the aesthetic stationery that has contained the letters and notes of the members is to be replaced by less costly paper. This announcement was made Wednesday by the joint committee on printing, which discovered that more than 11,000,000 embossed letter heads and envelopes have been used by members each year. Under the reform it is estimated a saving of \$30,000 a year will be made.

It takes from fifteen to twenty ears of corn to plant an acre. If one ear fails to grow, about 6 per cent of the stand is lost. About fifteen minutes of time is required to test enough corn by the ear method to plant an acre.

If there are any old apple trees on your farm that seem next to worthless think seriously before cutting them down. If necessary, get the opinion of an expert orchardist. Under proper treatment they may be made quite valuable, if taken in time.

The Cost Of Producing Gold.

A fearful toll of life is being exacted for the production of gold in the Rand. During six months no less than 2,413 claims were presented by operatives for compensation for loss due to consumption. During January there were no less than eleven of these applicants per day. Three thousand men are employed in rock drill work, and about half of these are knocked out every year. Since the Boer War no less than 100,000 human beings have lost their lives or their health as a result of their work in the Rand mines.

Americans as Coffee Drinkers.

Americans are said to drink as much coffee as all the rest of the world. Most of the coffee used in the United States is imported from Brazil, that country supplying five times as much of the article as is brought from all other countries combined.

THE BALKAN LEAGUE IS AT AN END, and war is now raging between the allied forces which combined to drive the Turk out of Europe. Bulgaria is fighting Serbia and Greece singlehanded, holding Greece in check, while hurling the main strength of the Bulgarian victorious army at the Serbians. Heavy losses are reported on both sides, but is extremely difficult to obtain reliable information as to the

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progress of the war. The refusal of Bulgaria to revise her treaty with Serbia add to accede to the demands of her allies regarding the partition of the spoils of war following peace with Turkey is the cause of the rupture. A serious feature of the situation is the determination of Roumania to mobilize her troops. What part Roumania intends to play is not yet apparent. Austria is seriously concerned over this incident, but it is the general belief that Roumania will play a waiting game.

MONEY IN ONIONS.

Where one is near the market, there is good money in onions if they are handled right. If good-sized specimens are desired for fall or winter use, thin them out now as you want them for the table until they are from four to six inches apart. Deep hoeing, so beneficial to most vegetable crops, is not so to onions, as the object with these is to keep the ground firm so that the bulbs may be more enlarged on its surface than they would be likely to be come if surrounded with loose soil. Hand weeding is the best in the lines. In very dry seasons, watering is some times advisable, but it should never be practised when the plants show signs of forming thick necks instead of the proper bulbs.

Over 1,000 persons joined in prayers for the suppression of caterpillars at St. Hilaire, Quebec, a few days ago. The farmers, their wives and children formed a great procession, stopping for prayers at the different stations on the road to Campbell Mountain.

NEW ZEALAND.

A large quantity of dynamite with a burning fuse attached was discovered on Tuesday under Christchurch barracks, Wellington, just in time to prevent the destruction of the building. The attempt is ascribed to some of the fanatics connected with the anti-militarist faction. All boys between 14 and 21 are required to attend periodical drills at the barracks, and fear is entertained that another attempt to destroy the building may be made.

A Keen Contest.—At a football match played between Ireland and Scotland one of the home supporters kept shouting out in great excitement, "Sit on 'em, Ireland!" An old Scotsman in the crowd was at length driven to make a retort. "You might be able to sit on the shamrock, mon, an' mebbe on the rose, but I tell ye ye canna sit on the 'hustle!'"

Precooled berries are now being shipped from California to Eastern cities, a large new cooling plant having just been constructed in one city of the Golden State under the supervision of a Government expert. Formerly Denver was the most distant point to which California berries could be shipped.

Fault finding gives friendship many a hard jolt.

Vilhjalmr Stefansson's polar exploring vessels will sail for the Arctic about one week, from Nome, Alaska. Dogs are being purchased for the expedition.
