The crop prospects are grand for this county. It is said that the total apple crop in the Annapolis valley for this season will not exceed 700,000 barrels, which is a great falling off over other years. The apple crop here, while not up to the crop of 1911, will be a good average crop, particularly the New Brunswickers and Fameuse. Potatoes are looking fine; they are dry without scab, and will produce a larger crop than last year. Buckwheat and other grain is fine and the oat crop is a good one. The hay, while not as large as last year, is of better quality and the market price is higher.

A. R. Gould, head of the Quebec and St. John Construction Co. which is building the Valley Railroad, was in Andover on Tuesday and in company with William Johnston went over the route of the road from Andover to the parish line. Mr. Gould stated that the contract for the line from Andover to Centreville has been let to McFarlane and McDonald, and that work will commence as soon as the question of right of way over the different properties has been disposed of.—Victoria Co.
