A MEMORABLE MUSICAL OCCASION.

For lack of space we are obliged to omit a fuller account of the Sacred Recital at the Woodstock School of Music Sunday evening. It was deserving of the highest praise and the large audience were very enthusiastic in their appreciation. The program herewith speaks for itself. Next week we will notice it further.

Hallelujah Chorus from the "Messiah" Handel. The Lost Chord arranged as unison Chorus, Sir Arthur Sullivan "The Heavens Are Telling," Chorus and Trio, preceded by the Recitatives "And God Said," and In Splendour Bright from "Creation" Haydn. Gloria in Excelsis, Chorus and quartette from the "Twelfth Mass," Mozart. Moonlight Boat Ride, arranged by Veazie from Il Trovatore, Verdi; sung by The Choral Society.

The Recitatives were sung by Mr. F. L. Mooers and the Trio by Mrs. Adney Mr. Burnham and Mr. Mooers. The Quartetts in the "Gloria" was composed of Mrs. Adney, Miss Irma Jones, Mr. F. L. Mooers and Mr. Burnham. Mrs. Geo. True sang "Consider and Hear Me" by Wooler. Mrs. Adney gave "With Verdure Clad," from "Creation" Haydn. "I Heard the Voice of Jesus Say," Ruthven, sung by Miss Besie Loane; "The Palms," Faure, sung by E. LeRoi Mooers. "The Good Shepherd," Barri; sung by Mr. F. L. Mooers made up the vocal part of the programme.

Adagio Sostenuto from Sonata, Moonlight op. 27, No. 2 was played by Mrs. Sanford Pugsley. Andante Con Variazioni from Sonata Op. 26., Beethoven and "Consolation" from "Songs Without Words", Mendelssohn; played by Miss Ruth Appleby.

Andante Maestoso "Funeral March" op. 26. Beethoven played by Miss Marion Diamond. Nocturne, Chopin; played by F. LeRoi Mooers. Prelude, two pianos in unison; played by Miss Elva Vanwart and Master Francis Glenn Adney. "The Loreley", by Seetung and the "Last Hope", Gottschalk; played in unison two pianos by Miss Jennie Dorey and Mrs. Adney. "Andante Pastoral" by Hunte; played by Master Walter Vanwart. "Golden Twilight Reverie, by La Fage; played by Miss Alice Peabody and Traumerel. Schumann; played by Miss Thelma Blake made up the instrumental part.
