

FAVE KILLED AND) MANY INSTRED.

NEW YORK, June 27.-Two hundred tons of fuel oil on board the steel tank steamer Mohawk, owned by the Standard Oil Company, exploded while the vessel was at anchor off Tempkinswille, Staten Island, killing five and inuring six others.

Fifty men, including the crew and twenty machinists, were making repairs preparatory to the Mohawk's departure for Tuxpan, Mexico. A thelper dropped a washer into the hold below the fire-room. Seeking to recover it, he cauried a lighted candle, which caused combustion among generated gases in the hold. The stern went completely under water but it is believed the rest of the hull is intact and that the steamer can be readily gotten into dry dock for repairs.

SPRINGFIELD, Ml., June 27. - Mrs. Edward F. Dunne, wife of the governor who signed the bill Thursday, which enfranchises 1,680,000 wom in this state "rejoices in common with the women of Illinois at his action." Mrs. Dunne, who is the mother of thirteen children, asserted she would exercise her right to vote at every opportunity.

"I am delighted that the woman suffrage bill has become a law," said Mrs. Dunne, "and particularly am I gratified that it was my husband's signature which permitted it to become a law. I expect to take advantage of any opportunity to exercise the right of suffrage which has been conferred upon me."

GALVESTON COTTON

CARNIVAL TO-DAY. GALVESTON, Texas, June 28-Thousands of persons paid tribute to King Cotton here to-day. The annual Cotton Carnival was opened under the most favorable conditions and with exhibits more numberous and varied than in any previous year Displays illustrating every phrase of the cottan industry could be seen on the exposition grounds with the exception of the loading for export. This portion of the display was conducted at the wharves, where the visitors were shown how cotton is stoned aboard the ships for tranportation to New York and Europe.

Washington, June 28-Work in the senate delayed the Democrats of that body yesterday in their party conference deliberations on the tariff bill When the caucus resumed its sessions last night it took up the fight over features of the agricultural products schedule. A demand has been made that all articles be put upon a penalty basis so that the president could have a tariff weapon to use against countries discriminating against the United States,

The senate Democratic caucus determaned to put cotton sewing thread on the free list. This was carried by one vote. A fifteen per cent. duty was car-Senator Simons, chairman of the committee said that he hoped to have the bill through the caucus by Monday night. It will then go to the full finance committee and probably be reported on Wednesday or Thursday.

CANADA'S HEAVY TOLL TO FIRES IN JUNE.

Toronto, July 4-According to the Monetary Times, Canada's fire losses during June smounted to \$3,069,446, this not including the losses from forest fires in Northern Ontario and New Brunswick. Losses for the same month last year were \$4,239,412. There were 39 fires with losses over \$10,000 and eight with losses of \$100,000 or more, a lumber mill fire in Prince Albert, Sask., leading the list with \$500,000 of a loss. Eighteen lives were lost. The Times' estimate of fire losses for the first half of this year 18 \$14, 325,463, with Oatario leading the provinces with \$3,620,260.




NEW EVENING PAPER IN MONTREAL SHORTLY.
