## TEACHER'S INSTITUTE.

(Continued from page 1.)

H. B. Durost spoke on the root, soil and conditions necessary for growth. THURSDAY EVENING.

The evening session opened at 8.15, principal Denham in the chair. The large assembly room was well filled.

The following gentlemen occupied seats on the platform,—Premier Flemming, Mayor Jones, Inspector Meagher, Inspector Steeves, W. B. Belyea, chairman of the school board, George E. Balmain, members of the trustee board, Fletcher Peacock and Colonel F. H. J. Dibblee.

Mayor W. P. Jones in a short address welcomed the teachers to Woodstock, also extended a welcome to all citizens who took an interest in the proceeding. Spoke of the good the teaching profession was doing for the country. The advantages of Free Schools.

Mayor Jones address was followed by a trio by Mrs. H. Lockwood, Mrs. Geo. Gibson and Mrs. R. E. Holyoke. The next speaker, Inspector Steeves, said that the last institute he attended in Woodstock was held in the old rink. Compared the old Grammar School with the New Memorial School, one of the finest in the Province or indeed in the Maritime Provinces. Spoke of the late L. P. Fisher's love for children, spoke of improvement in methods of teaching. In the old days it was all book work. At present time, learn also by doing, give exercise in all faculties, Manuel Training, Domestic Science, Nature Study and Agriculture. Any line of work that has not new problems to solve is dead.
