**COUNTY COUNCIL**

Continued from last week

Council resumed session at 10 a.m. The auditor submitted the following supplementary report showing the indebtedness as between the County and the parishes.

 Building Committee—Couns. Burt, Phillips and Melville.  
 Coun. Melville submitted the report of the Building Committee.

The report showed that the bill of repairs on the gaol, on what might be called capital account amounted in all to \$5,802.83. Of this amount \$3172.00 was paid for the new steel cells, which replace the antiquated cells that were originally built. Upon current account the amount paid on gaol was \$552.86 Paid on Court House 449.23 Paid on Record Office 139.33

Total \$1169.81  
 Coun. Phillips explained that they had tried to get satisfactory meter rates from the Electric Light Company, but it was found it would be quite as expensive as the present rate. The Finance Committee submitted

ing of an unusual nature occurs we believe that the County will be able to meet all expenditures and have a small balance to credit. Above are the items making up an assessment.

Finance Committee  
 Coun. Gallagher—The most of the charges are fixed. There was an increase in health. The Interest charge has been cut down \$80.00 this year. The report was adopted.

Coun. Melville—I do not like to prepare for a big deficit in the Scott Act next year.

Coun. H. E. Gallagher—This is the deficit this year that is to be paid.

The secretary referred to a bill from an officer in Sussex for \$10.00 for the arrest of a circus man who created trouble in 1908. By an error the matter was omitted in previous years. The bill was for money paid out, not for services. Bill ordered paid.

Coun. Gibson moved that Mr. J. A. Lindsay be heard before the Board in a matter touching Northampton Parish. Carried.

Mr. Lindsay read a petition from Enoch Marsten saying that he has assessed \$7.85 in 1911 on a valuation of \$900, while he was in debt \$750.00. In 1912 the valuation was raised to \$1000. Mr. Marsten had said he had appealed to the assessors without avail.

Coun. Stevens—Was it real or personal property?

Mr. Lindsay—Real and personal.

Coun. Tompkins moved that the petition be received and placed on the table and the matter referred back to the assessors of Northampton. Coun. Williams seconded.

Coun. Phillips—This is the first I have heard of the matter. Mr. Marsten is assessed only on real estate and I do not think he is over assessed.

Motion carried.

Coun. Stevens for a committee on the claim of costs by A. B. Connell etc., reports that the suits were in connection with the Scott Act and that a settlement could be made for \$110.00. Mr. Connell told him that one, McIntyre, was supposed to be guilty of a violation of the Scott Act. He was arrested. A sick child of his was taken away to be cared for when he was arrested. McIntyre lost two actions, one for damages and one for false imprisonment. It was to have been tried in York Co., but Mr. Connell succeeded in getting the venue changed to Carleton Co. and then the matter dropped. The officers he thought did not exceed their duty.

Coun. Williams moved, seconded by Coun. Shaw that the report be received and adopted.

Coun. Shaw reported on a matter of new shelving for the record office. The Registrar thinks it is almost a matter of absolute necessity. The cost of installing the new shelving would be some \$725.00. We as a committee do not make any recommendation.

Coun. Melville—There are now wooden shelves and there are a dozen books for which there is no accommodation. Wooden shelves would cost very little and unless it is necessary he did not see the need of steel shelves. \$15 or \$20 would put up sufficient wooden shelves. It seems every year our expense is getting larger.

Coun. Williams agreed with Coun. Melville. He moved that the report be received and that necessary wooden shelves be put in under the direction of the Building Committee.

Coun. Montgomery seconded the motion. Carried.

Coun. Shaw moved that Mr. Tappan Adney be heard before the Council. Carried.

Mr. Adney referred to the Fruit Growers exhibition held in St. John some time ago when he secured promise of a large amount of fruit from this County for the Exhibition. It was his aim to show the amount of fruit that was raised and shipped from this county. For instance he was enabled to show that 14,000 barrels were shipped out of this county in one season. We had a very attractive exhibition in St. John, by his efforts, which attracted a good deal of attention. The only item of expense he had had returned was that the Imperial Packing Co. paid for the placard he had arranged advertising the county. He produced items showing that he expended some \$32.00. That was the actual outlay. He put in no claim for his time, while he had no legal claim on the County he thought it a matter of justice that he should be recouped for the money he spent. He had taken up the matter carried it through to a successful issue. The matter was exceptional and he left it to the county to decide as to the justice of his claim. He also urged the County to do something by way of publicity.

The Warden said through Mr. Adney much good had been done for the County in the way of advertisement, and it was hardly fair that one person should bear this expense. Coun. Williams felt Mr. Adney had done a good deal for the country only he did not wish to establish a precedent. He moved that the council recommend the Commissioner of Agriculture and pay the bill. Seconded and carried.

Coun. Lamont reported on the bills and accounts saying the committee had gone over them carefully and made recommendations. The Council, upon motion of Coun. Stevens, went into committee on consideration of bills and accounts.
