Window Broken, Letters Burned

LONDON, Feb. 1.—Owing to the threats of the militant suffragettes to wreck and ruin public property until their demands have been granted, the royal palaces of Kensington, Hampton Court and Holyrood have been closed to the public until further notice. The official notification published this morning however, is silent as to the cause of this action by the public authorities.

All the palaces are favorite resorts of the people, whose wrath, it is thought, will be visited on the suffragettes whenever an opportunity offers. The public museums and similar institutions are, it is reported also to be closed.

The precautions taken by the authorities in the various public buildings were fully justified, as this afternoon a suffragette entered the Tower of London, and smashed a glass case in the jewel house with a piece of iron hidden in the sleeve of her coat. She was arrested.

LONDON, Feb. 1.—In London yesterday there was another outbreak of window smashing and two windows of the Labor Exchange in Catherine Street Strand, were broken by a woman

last night. The women escaped but left a new hammer behind. Further pillar box outrages were reported. While clearing a letter box at the Lavender Hill post office, a postman found a broken paper parcel in flames. The parcel was addressed to the "Right Hon. John Burns," and on it was written; "Something to go, one better in store."

The parcel contained a bottle of inflammable fluid. At Cheltenham liquid gum was poured into a pillar box with the result that the letters were found fastened together. At Birmingham six pillar boxes were fired by means of chemicals many letters being destroyed. Corrosive acid was used to destroyed postal packets in some pillar boxes in Liverpool.

The suffragettes have hit upon a new idea in destruction which is likely to make all gossiers their bitter enemies. The women have declared warfare on golf courses and yesterday in the neighborhood of Birmingham, they visited four links and damaged many putting greens beyond repair. Some of these were torn up, while on others the suffragettes write with acid the words "Votes for Women."

LONDON, Jan. 30.—One of the boldest suffragettes ever arrested by the police, was taken in the toils this evening, after she had attacked the residence of the Archbishop of Canterbury, and smashed several windows. The woman admitted she had planned to attack Buckingham Palace, and, if possible, get a personal interview with King George. Her confession resulted in orders being issued to allow no women within the grounds at Buckingham Palace, save those known to be anti-suffragists.

The "Suffragette," a votes-for-women publication, the editor of which is Miss Christabel Pankhurst, for whom all Scotland Yard is hunting as the instigator of the window-smashing riots, to-day says: "The issue depends solely on the women. Unless they are prepared to pay the price, they cannot expect any help from the men. Militancy is the only weapon left to us, and its possibilities are far from exhausted."

From different parts of the country further pillar box attacks are reported, and in London two hundred postal packets were destroyed by tar being poured into pillar boxes in the West.

While the sorting staff of the Croydon post office were at work last night several packages burst into flames and gave off thick fumes. When a postman cleared the letter box at York, a letter took fire. It contained two glass tubes of liquid which ignited on exposure to air. Similar outrages were committed at other pillar boxes. Many letters containing tubes were addressed to "Asquith, London."

The suffragettes vainly attempted to secure admission to a hall where Mr. Asquith was speaking at Leven last night. The crowd tolerated their conduct at first; but soon adopted a threatening attitude towards the women. The police rushed to the rescue, and a

free fight followed wherein the police were compelled to make a baton charge.
Conn., Feb. 1.—Six hundred persons, most of whom were suffragists, who were listening to an address by Dr. Anna Howard Shaw, president of the National Suffrage Association, in the Danielson Theatre last night, were thrown into confusion, when John Frisbie, a rich farmer of Mechanicsville, interrupted the speaker and proposed marriage to her.
"Just a minute, Miss Shaw," shouted Frisbie, "I have been a widower for eighteen years. Will you marry me and make me happy? I have plenty for us both."

For several minutes Dr. Shaw stood speechless. Then she cried out dramatically:
"I don't want a wedding ring, all I want is the vote."
"I hope you never get the vote, if that's the way you feel about it," was Frisbie's parting shot, as he left the hall.

The deceased was buried under the order of L. O. L. of Benton of which he was a member for over fifty years. Rev. Frank Baird of Woodstock preached the sermon at Oak Mountain Kirk. The text was 2nd., Tim. 4:7. I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course I have kept the faith.

good roads can be obtained for this province. All were unanimous in the opinion that the roads needed improvement, and with the idea of properly urging the matter upon the provincial government a Provincial Good Roads Association was formed, and it will present to the legislature the resolutions passed at the convention yesterday, and a strong delegation will be formed to accompany the memorial to Fredericton and see that it is properly presented.

The convention was large, and matters were thoroughly discussed, and all sides of the questions considered before the resolutions were passed. Harmony prevailed, and conservatives and liberals, united on the common ground of poor roads, declared that the roads should be taken out of politics. The discussion was of non-political character and each one present was intent on one idea of getting good roads, and getting them as soon as possible.

The government of the province will be asked to appoint a properly qualified engineer to have complete charge of the roads and instruct road masters and others in the matters of
