A GOOD RELISH.

Many people object to mutten because of a strong flavor. This comes from the oil in the wool which penetrates to the skin and causes it to taste unpleasantly; but if you will cut off this thin skip over the fat and flesh you will find the strong flavor gone.

Mutton may be served rare, but amb must be served well done at all times. The leg, loin, saddle and forquarter are used for roas!ng, and the neck-bones and other oney pieces may serve for soups and stews. The crown reat, which is the handsomest and nost expensive of meat which car e served, is formed of the entire cack --- he chep, tied together and ousted with the tone ends scraped nd standing out to stimulate a rowr.

Our Trade With Germany.

A press despatch from Montreal says Canada's exports to Germany increased from some three and one half million dollars for the whole ot the fiscal year ending with March 31st, 1912, to ten and onehalf millions during the late season of navigation.

This phenomenal advance is due to two causes-the lessening of ariff restrictions in trade between the two countries, following upon the end of the turit war, and the growing dependence of Girmany on foreign sources for her food to the bettom, then pour off the supply' This dependence is bound to increase with the years and as a consequence Germany may soon be expected to equal Britain as a market food stuffs.

To-day Germany is Britain's most important foreign customer. In a few years, if normal conditions continue, she may be expected to rank next to United States and Britain as a market for Canada's exports. What folly it is to alk of war with a country with which we have no quarrel and on the prosperity of which the prosper ty of Britain and Canada so largely depende?
