instruct county superintendents and by means of letters and news paper articles be capable of carrying on a good road educative campaign throughout the province.

This was moved by R. B. Emerson and seconded by R. D. Paterson. It was carried without a dissenting vote.

The meeting then adjourned to meet the evening.

On motion of P. W. Thomson, seconded by F. W. Wallace, it was resolved that this convention advise the encouragement of municipalities in abolishing statute labor by the offer on the part of the provincial government, of a bonus to any municipality or district electing to pay its own road tax assessment in cash; also the complete abolishment of statute labor by law, wherever, and as rapidly as conditions will permit.

S. L. Peters thought that this matter should be optional with the different communities. The resolution was passed without opposition.

It was moved by R. D. Paterson, and seconded by R. B. Emerson that the provincial government be asked to permanently improve and maintain three trunk roads as provincial highways, and that they be kept in repair under what is

known as the patrol system. The road designated were as follows:

(a) From the U. S. boundary at St. Stephen eastward by way of St. George St. John, Hampton, Sussex, Petitcodiac Moncton, and Dorchester, to the provincial boundary between Sackville and Amherst.

(b) From St. John northward by way of Fredericton, Woodstock, and to the boundary line, thence to Andover, Grand Falls, and Edmundston to the Quebec boundary at St. Jacques.

(c) From Alma eastward and northward by way of Moncton, Shediac, Buctouche, Richibucto, Bay-du-Vin, Chatham, Newcastle, Tracadie, Caraquet, and Bathurst to Campbellton.

These trunk roads would intersect every county in the province, and connect all the principle towns and villages by a main line of communication.

F. E. Sharp was opposed to this idea, and said that the railways answered the needs of the people along these roads.

S. L. Peters was in favor of the establishment of the trunk roads, but he was opposed to the idea of having statute labor abolished and this section was cut from the original resolution, making it read as above.

W. B. Tennant explained that the reason of the roads being designated as above was because it had been intimated that the dominion government would make a special grant for permanent trunk roads in this province, and he thought that this was only a suggestion along the lines which would likely be worked out.

On motion of James Carr, of Carleton county, the road between Woodstock and the boundary line was included in the trunk road.

F. S. Sharp, of Kings, moved as an amendment that all roads in the province be included, but the motion was defeated and the original motion passed. The Evening Times-Star, St. John.
