Mrs Annie Davis

(Rosindale News.)
Mrs. Annie Davis, widow of George H. Davis, and for 27 years a resident of Rosindale, died Monday July 14 at the residence of her son, William H. Davis, 73 Cohasset street, in her 80th year.
Mrs. Davis, formerly Annie Campbell, was born at Glasgow, Scotland, in 1834, and came to this country when a child, the family settling in Boston. She was a relative of the late Dr. Withrow, formerly minister of Park street church, Boston. For many years she resided in South Boston.
She leaves three children, William H. Davis, the well-known news dealer of Poplar street, Geo. H. Davis of Colberg avenue, and Mrs. Isabelle S. Currie of Needham.
Mrs. Davis was a devoted Christian woman and a member of the Rosindale Congregational church. She joined the Scotch Presbyterian church at an early age. Mrs. Davis was well-known and highly esteemed for her many sterling qualities of heart and mind. Her uppermost thought always was to do for others. She was a great reader and was well-informed on past and present events of public interest.
Mrs. Davis and her family moved from Woodstock to Rosindale, and have many relatives and friends in Carleton Co.

Friday's Concert Recital.

In the opinion of the audience which though not large was composed of our most cultured people and from the musical standpoint this was the most enjoyable, artistic, and delightful concert ever given in the town. Every number was a gem and the youngest performers rendered their parts with the skill of professionals. The concert opened with a chorus "Lovely night, O Tender Night," from the Opera "The Tales of Hoffmann," was sung with beauty and delicacy of feeling. The sweet rhythmic flowing melody enhanced by the accompaniment imitating the harp charmed all.

Miss Thelma Blake made her debut next as a solo artist playing the Valse op. 83 Durand with great dash and brilliancy and following with that greatest of all short music poems Traumeire by Schumann which was played with breathed of expression and tender feeling surprising in so young a performer. "The Last Rose of Summer" as sung next by Mrs. Adney was great. The trills and delicate ornamentations being rendered with sweetness and power and every word of the lovely song floated out distinct and clear. The audience listened as if spellbound. Mr. Le Roi Mooers beautiful accompaniment without notes put the finishing touch.

The "Moonlight Boat Ride" arranged from the 3rd act of "Il Trovatore". Verdie by the Chorus was beautifully sung, the difficult music of the opera being unaltered but with other text.

Miss Blake and Master Adney next performed from memory on two pianos in unison the original edition of Polonaise op 40 No 1 Chopin known as the Military. Only great players do feats like this. But these two young Goliaths made the listeners wonder. Not a missing note from the great chords in the warlike music and the brilliant octava passages all were done with great power and without apparent effort.

"Three Fishers" Kingsley-Hullah and the "Rosary" Nevin were sung by Miss Irma Jones who made her first bow to the public in solo. Miss Jones possesses a voice of great promise. She has been the leading alto in chorus and quartette work for the past two years but her voice is not yet matured. With her talent for music (she is already a good pianist) and her lovely voice, she has ability to become a great artist. The playing of the two small daughters of Mayor Jones who have just finished their first two weeks of piano study with Mrs. Adney, bought "down the house." Dorothy is eight and Audrey five years of age. In the duet "From Do to Soh" with Mrs. Adney at the second piano their time and precision of tonight were perfect. That great Bass solo "The Palms" Faure, was sung by Mr. Le Roi Mooers with fine voice and effect. The young man is a fine pianist but he also has a great voice both for Solo and Concerted work, and could easily make a handsome income with his musical talents.

The "Hallelujah Chorus" from the "Messiah" Handel was finely sung. The small chorus composed of good musicians and trained singers made up in quality what it lacked in numbers and so this exceedingly difficult music received good treatment.

Waltz op. 64, No 1. Pulce op. 28 No 20 Chopin and the Grande Paraphrase de Concert "The Mocking Bird" by Edward Hoffman were played on two pianos by Mrs. Adney and Master Adney. Such piano work cannot be surpassed and the listeners found it hard to decide which played the better of the two.

Annie Laurie that old Scotch Song with the lovely words set to an equally lovely tune was beautifully rendered by Miss Bessie Loane with a quartette refrain by Miss Irma Jones and the Messrs. Mooers.
