Arbitrary freight rates was the chief sybject under discussion and it was threshed out backward and forward, up and down, but the only conclusion arrived at was summoned up in a few words by Mr. Thomas Noddin. "The C. P. R. just naturally don't recognize the people in Woodstock at all."

J. T. A. Dibblee reported for the transportation committee and read a communication from the C. P. company, giving freight Railway rates on imports and exports from the west to St. John, Fredericton, Woodstock and up-river points via McAdam Jct The schedule showed that in many cases the rate to Woodstock was fully 50 p. c. higher than to Fredericton, and that the charges are less to Edmundston than to Woodstock, although the former is some 75 miles the longer haul.

The subject was thoroughly discussed by Pres. Jarvis, Sec. Holyoke F. B. Carvell, J. T. A. Dibblee, Thos. Noddin and others, Mr. Manzer, the local freight agent, spoke at some length on the subject of freight rates, traffic, etc. but was unable to convince his hearers that Woodstock was getting a fair deal.

On motion of Mr. Dibblee, Pr. sident Jarvis, Secretary Holjoke and F. B. Carvell, were appointed a committee to take up the matter with the C. P. R. with the view of obtaining better rates for Woodstock.

Mr. Dibblee said Kennedy & McDonald, contractors, intend running a passenger train from Woodstock to Centreville over the completed section of the Valley Railway. I suggested to Mr. McDonald, that he leave Centreville early in the morning returning in the evening, thus giving up-river residents a chance to spend the greater part of the day in Woodstock, but he informed me that on account of lack of facilities for housing their engines at Centreville they would be obliged to start in the morning from Woodstock. He suggested that the company might leave Woodstock early in the morning and make two trips each way each day, that is providing the patronage warranted such a schedule.

A. D. Holyoke thought it would be a good plan to interview Messrs. Kennedy & McDonald regarding the running of special excursion trains from Centreville to Woodstock for five or six days previous to Xmas.

On notion of J. T. A. Dibblee, sec. by F. B, Carvell, sec, Holyoke was instructed to get into communication with The steel bridge for the Val- Messrs. Kennedy & McDonald and given authority to spend an amount not exceeding \$25,00 in advertising excursions.

> F. B. Carvell said it had occurred to him that the I. C. R. authorities might be asked to give a service over the Valley Rosd between Woodstock and Centreville. He pointed out that according to the agreement between the provincial government and the I. C. R. ehe later was to take over and operate each section as completed. ville was practically completed, with the exception of the building of station houses, and he thought there was no doubt the I. C. R. authorities would be willing to give the much needed service through the winter, or at least assist Messrs. Kennedy & McDonald in maintaing the service. Mr. Mc-Donald had informed him that owing to lack of rolling stock, plows, etc., they would not be able to operate the road in the event of a snow blockade.

On motion of J. T. A. Dibblee, sec., by F. B. Carvell, the secretary was instructed to communicate with Mr. Guetilius, general manager of the I. C. R., with reference to giving assistance to Kennedy & McDonald in maintaining a regular train service during the winter between Centreville and Woodstck.

Pres. Jarvis in closing briefly addressed the young members of the Board, assuring them taat their presence at the meeting was much appreciated by the older members, and urging them to take a more active part in the discussion of important matters which come before the Board from time to time.

On motion meeting adjourned to meet the second Monday in January.
