Mr. Hartley explained the different acts under which the bonus was given to the company, as well as the resolution exempting the Imperial Packing Co. from taxes for ten years. In discussing the methods to get rid of the lien, there are only two courses to pursue. One is to foreclose and sell; this would not be pleasant for the company nor to the members of the Council. The second and probably tetter course is for the Council to enter into an agreement with the promoters to accept a certain sum and the town would then give a quit-cliam deed to the company and release all claims that the town may have against the property.

Coun. Balmain said that he had in his possession the list of delinquent taxes for the years 1910-11-12; in 1910, there was \$2126.75 due; in 1911, \$2482,-50, and the last year the delinquents owed \$4017.50. Since the resolution of the Council ordering the publishing of the delinquent list, a considerable amount of taxes had been collected. In view of what had taken place the publishing of the list might be deferred until after July 1st.

Coun. Lindsay did not like the idea of going back on the records of the Coun-

of going back on the records. The finance committee may find it necessary to rublish the list before July 1st.

Coun Jones-We have been striving in every way and almost getting on our knees coaxing people to pay their taxes, but without avail. There is not a man at the board who wishes to see the list putlished but it seems to be the only way.

Moved by Couns. Balmain and Libblee and passed that the publishing of delinquent list be deferred until after July 1st.

John S. Leighton, jr., the special collector of town taxes, said the trouble now was that there were two collectors the town treasurer and himself and defaulters play one against the other. If the books were given to him alone and the rate increased from 5 per cent he would collect all the taxes that could be collected by the most stringent methods of law Probably 25 per cent of the taxes could not be col ected as there were some names on the list who are not now nor were they re sidents of the town when the tax list was made up.
